

Fritton with St. Olaves


The Fritton with St. Olaves Parish Council Meeting was held at St. Olaves

Village Hall on July 28st with eight Parish Councillors, the Parish Clerk Kate Ruddock, Borough Councillor Adrian Myers, County Councillor Carl Annison and four members of the public present, Councillor Stannas Bellaby chaired the meeting.

It was announced that the Council has applied for the Decoy Public House to be nominated as a Community Asset. Against this the Council discussed the latest application to demolish the property and build 5 houses, the applicants agent stated his disappointment at the attempt to make the existing property a Community Asset but did say that the application might now be amended to two larger properties. The Council agreed to object to the current application using the same list of objections used for the last application in November 2021.

Other planning applications discussed were 2 New Road, Fritton (single story rear extension), no objection but where does the oil tank reposition to. And Fairway Lakes, Caldecott Hall (4 new Nord Lodges) agreed by a 5-3 majority to be no objections subject to neighbours comments.

Councillor Johnson reported on a meeting with MP Brandon Lewis, and County Councillor permission for the installation, also local Annison, on the A143 speeding issues, the site businesses have been contacted to contribute



Constabulary now have two additional mobile enforcement camera vehicles available.

On highways the A143/Herringfleet Road junction is to be resurfaced in the autumn when a road closure will be needed, also the forest end of New Road is to be re-surfaced and County Councillor Annison will find out if and when the footpath outside Fritton Village Hall will be resurfaced.

There was a discussion on proposals to create a Neighbourhood Plan covering the three parishes of Fritton & St Olaves, Belton & Browston and Burgh Castle, this would give the councils to record their ideas for the future and a decision on whether to proceed or not will be taken at the September meetings of all three Councils.

The clerk reported on a request from the Borough Council about play equipment at the New Road site, it was felt that the existing equipment needs modernising and that new equipment should be inclusive and suitable for all ages. The Broads Authority have confirmed that they own the land where it is proposed to put a new Jubilee commemorative bench, planning permission will not be required and the owners of the Priory have given access permission for the installation, also local businesses have been contacted to contribute

meet to the costs involved.

In the public section concerns were raised that a farmer is using the track which leads to the Round House in Waveney Forest and that this is leading to some trees and fencing being knocked down, Councillor Story agreed to investigate and report to Newcombe Estates, he also reported that some bracken is to be removed to give the fire service access to the river.

The next Parish Council Meeting is scheduled to be held at Fritton Village Hall on Thursday September 29th (7.30pm), although it is possible that this date might be brought forward two weeks, please check with the Parish Clerk on 07899 846148, e-mail fritton.stolaves.clerk@outlook.com.

Rodent Racism

Readers may not know that grey squirrels (squirus carolinensis) are an oppressed minority worldwide, confined to eastern North America and the UK.

The great majority of squirrels are the common squirrels (squirus vulgaris), usually red or black, who range across much of the world.

Seemingly, however, the world is not enough and Crown Agencies are taking vigorous steps to suppress UK grey squirrels, in favour of reds. Measures which some may deem unacceptably cruel.

It is true that squirrels cause significant damage to trees and predate on birds' eggs, but this can never justify the cruel 'control measures' inflicted on greys.

Control measures include ground trapping of adult squirrels leaving squirrel kits (who need mother for ten weeks) to die in the Drey.

Also trapped squirrels are 'humanely' killed either being shot with a 0.22 calibre air pistol or tipped into a close woven black fabric bag, where it can be held with the head in one corner and killed by 'cranial dispatch' using a cosh.

Are'nt you glad you are not a grey squirrel.

A Word from your Local MP and Councillors

MP writes



Although Parliament is in recess as I write these words, we aren't seeing the "national politics freezone" that we would normally enjoy during the summer holiday season. The tumultuous events that unfolded in Westminster has transitioned into a hotly contested race to be Conservative Party Leader

and our country's next Prime Minister. I am supporting fellow Norfolk MP Liz Truss to lead our nation and provide the strong leadership we need as we recover from the pandemic and deal with global economic challenges.

I continue to deal with the day-to-day casework and local issues that come to my attention. The recess gives me an opportunity to visit various organisations, meet with key people, and pop into events whilst I am out and about. It was a delight to visit the Gorleston Clifftop Festival at the beginning of the holiday – and I bumped into many familiar faces from the villages whilst I was there. It's unsurprising

after two summers of restrictions that this was one of the biggest festivals in recent years. It takes a huge effort to organise an event like this and all those involved behind the scenes should be congratulated on such a successful event. To see so many people out and about enjoying everything on offer was a fantastic feeling.

I know that families from near and far will also enjoy the new Marina Centre. I enjoyed seeing the finished facility at the opening event. We should be proud that Great Yarmouth has a new attraction that isn't just for visitors but can be used by everyone within our community. Building projects like this are always a challenge. Without the determination of Carl Smith and his fellow councillors we would not see this beacon of massive multi-million-pound investment in our area at all.

That Government investment includes plans for a new James Paget Hospital. Whilst that project is only in its early stages I received an update during a meeting with Jo Segasby the new hospital chief. And we discussed an issue that concerns many constituents – the impact of social care system delays on patient discharge. I've taken up that issue, and other NHS matters, with Health Ministers and will update you in the months ahead.

majority of cases there is little correlation between the two. A piece by Ambrose Evans-Pritchard (Daily Telegraph) who compulsively exaggerates the EU's relative economic performance over the UK's has actually stated the following (slightly abridged).

If you think the UK has high inflation by international standards, you have been misinformed.

The O.E.C.D'S June reading for the developed states places UK inflation in the middle of the pack at 8.2% which is below the average which is 10.3%. The UK is below Spain(10.2), Belgium (9.6) the US (9.1), Sweden, Austria, and Portugal (8.7) and the Netherlands at 8.6%. The UK's inflation rate (June) is higher than Italy (8.0) and Germany(7.6) which has suppressed the headline figure with near on free tickets on trains and public transport.

France is much lower (5.8%), why? Because the French has bucked the market trend and imposed price controls on gas and electricity. The annual household rise is Just 4%. However, half of the French nuclear power stations are out of action. The spot market price on Wednesday 15th June in France was 488 euros per Mwh (offset by the French Government) and the UK's was 256 euros per Mwh.

So yes, the UK inflation rate is high and climbing, but not due to Brexit but to high fuel prices, the war in the Ukraine and

supply issues, of which all countries in economic Europe are experiencing.

The other month I wrote about the bank of England raising interest rates to (get inflation under control) I stated even though I am not an economist, I do not understand how raising interest rates which means, higher mortgages, higher business loans leading to less investment and the possible start of higher unemployment, in any way helps the economy. It is not wage rises, it is not an overheating economy through growth or even a falling pound on the international financial markets which in the past, have been used as an excuse to raise interest rates, but national commodity prices, supply issues and the war in the Ukraine, all of which the people of this country have absolutely no control over whatsoever. Recession is measured by two quarters of negative growth. It seems to me that the interest hike rises which we are now told is to "stop inflation becoming embedded" not only adds to inflation because basic items will need to go up to meet companies increasing costs but will in fact PUSH us into recession as there is less money in the economy to spend due to the populace having to service debt and meet higher prices in the shops and fuel bills and that in itself, contributes to negative growth.

Finally. As I write this Brent crude is now at \$97 a barrel last month \$112. Gas is now (July) 91% higher than when at its peak it was 145% higher than in September2021, so why, if supply companies are trading at a profit today, is the price cap going to be raised in October and January? Instead of supporting households further (I am not against the emergency support already given), just do not lift the cap higher and keep prices where they are today or even lower them, because all the government is doing is subsidising private companies via the consumer.

Useful Health Checks For All

Information from age uk website August 22

We all worry about our health as we get older. But by undergoing routine health checks, which take just minutes to perform, you can spot any problems in the early stages when they are easier to treat.

BLOOD PRESSURE TESTS

Blood pressure is the force that your blood exerts on the walls of your arteries. High blood pressure can weaken your heart and damage the walls of your arteries, increasing the risk of heart disease, stroke and kidney disease.

What's involved?

Your GP or practice nurse will use a cuff that fits around your upper arm and is inflated until it becomes tight. The test is quick and painless and only takes a minute.

Why is the test important?

Around 30% of adults in England have high blood pressure, but many don't realise as they often have no symptoms.

What happens next?

If your results fall outside of the normal range you will need to have it checked several more times. If your blood pressure is found to be consistently high, your GP will talk to you about how to lower it.

You may be offered a blood test to check the functioning of your kidneys and a test to check your risk of developing diabetes. Treatment may include lifestyle changes, and if these are not successful or your blood pressure is very high, you are likely to be prescribed medication.

BOWEL CANCER SCREENING

Bowel cancer screening doesn't diagnose cancer, but it can detect potential problems before a person has symptoms.

What's involved?

The testing kit, called a Faecal Occult Blood Test (FOBt), is sent through the post and requires participants to collect stool samples over several days on a special card, which is then sent to a laboratory for analysis.

Screening is offered every 2 years to all men and women aged 60 to 74. People over 75 can also request a screening kit by calling the freephone helpline 0800 707 6060.

Why is the test important?

Bowel cancer is the fourth most common cancer in the UK and the

sooner it is detected, the easier it is to treat and the better your chance of surviving it.

What happens next?

The test looks for traces of blood; if there is any sign of this, you will be asked to carry out the test again. This doesn't mean that you have bowel cancer, but you may need a bowel examination called a colonoscopy to rule out this possibility. A small percentage of people will have an abnormal result, and will need follow-up tests.

BREAST SCREENING

Most experts agree regular breast screening is beneficial in picking up breast cancer early and the earlier it is found the better the chances of surviving it. The main risk is that breast screening sometimes picks up cancers that may not have caused any symptoms or become lifethreatening. You may end up having unnecessary extra tests and treatment. You can read about the pros and cons of breast cancer screening on the NHS Choices website.

What's involved?

An x-ray of each breast, called a mammogram, is taken. Each breast is placed in turn on the x-ray machine and is gently but firmly compressed with a clear plate. The compression only lasts a few seconds, but some women do find this slightly uncomfortable.

Why is the test important?

Around 1 in 8 women in the UK are diagnosed with breast cancer during their lifetime.

How often should you get checked?

You'll receive your first invitation to attend your local breast screening unit sometime between your 50th and 53rd birthdays. In some areas, you'll be invited from the age of 47 and until the age of 73 as the NHS is in the process of extending the screening programme as a trial. From then on, you will be invited every three years until your 70th birthday.

Although you may not receive an invitation for screening once you reach 70, you can request a screen every three years. Your GP surgery can tell you who to call. You should be given a card at your last routine screen to remind you of this entitlement.

What happens next?

The results will be sent to you and your GP no later than 2 weeks after the screening. Most women receive a normal result but some may be asked to go to an assessment clinic for more tests.

CERVICAL SCREENING

Cervical screening is a method of preventing cancer by detecting abnormalities which, if left untreated, could lead to cancer in a woman's cervix.

What's involved?

A doctor or nurse inserts an instrument called a speculum to open the woman's vagina and uses a small soft brush to sweep around the cervix. Most women say it's slightly uncomfortable but not painful.

Why is the test important?

About 3,000 cases of cervical cancer are diagnosed each year in the UK. Since the screening programme was introduced in the 1980s, the number of cervical cancer cases has decreased by about 7% each year.

How often should you get checked?

All women aged 25-64 are eligible for a free cervical screening test every 3-5 years. Women over 65 are not usually invited for screening unless they haven't been screened since age 50 or have had an abnormal result in any of their three most recent tests.

What happens next?

You should receive the result of your test within two weeks. Most screening results are normal, but if you are recalled, this doesn't necessarily mean that you have cancer. For around 1 in 20 women the test shows some abnormal changes which will require further investigation and treatment.

CHOLESTEROL TESTS

Cholesterol is a type of fat that is carried around the body in the blood. High levels of cholesterol can build up in the arteries and increase your risk of heart attack or stroke.

What's involved?

You can have your cholesterol level measured with a simple blood test at your GP surgery.

Why is the test important?

High cholesterol doesn't cause any symptoms, so you could have it without knowing. The only way to find out is to have the test. What happens next?

If you have high cholesterol you can lower it by changing your diet, maintaining a healthy weight and taking regular exercise. If you already have heart disease or are at risk of developing it, your GP may prescribe cholesterol-lowering medicines such as statins.

NHS HEALTH CHECK

The NHS Health Check is a free check-up of your overall health. It can tell you whether you're at higher risk of getting certain health problems, such as heart disease, diabetes, kidney disease and stroke.

What's involved?

An NHS Health Check takes about 20-30 minutes.

The health professional will ask you some simple questions about your lifestyle and family history, measure your height and weight, and take your blood pressure and do a blood test – often using a small finger prick test.

Why is the test important?

Based on the results of your questions and blood test, your health professional will be able to give you an idea of your chances of getting heart disease, stroke, kidney disease and diabetes.

If you're over 65, you will also be told the signs and symptoms of dementia to look out for. You will then receive personalised advice to lower your risk.

When will I be invited for an NHS health check?

You'll be invited for a free NHS Health Check every five years if you're between 40 and 74 years of age and do not already have heart disease, stroke, diabetes, kidney disease or high blood pressure.

If you're registered with a GP surgery that offers the NHS Health Check, you should automatically get an invitation. Don't worry if you haven't been invited yet – you will be over the next five years.

Alternatively, your local authority will send you an appointment letter explaining where you have to go for your NHS Health Check.

If you're not sure if you're eligible for an NHS Health Check and would like one, or if you are eligible but haven't had an NHS Health Check in the last five years, ask your GP for an appointment now.



ALL SAINTS BELTON Rev Rosie Writes



e live in troubling times, when many of us have real concerns about our lives. It is often in the difficult times that we turn to prayer. Someone recently said to me that they pray to God because "where else can I turn". They went on to say that what they loved about prayer was that they could tell God anything about life that was worrying them, and that they were stressed about, and that usually prayer made them feel better and more relaxed. I must admit that I too find it really helpful to talk to God about the difficulties in life that I have to deal with, and He makes a difference. It's not that the problems disappear but that I find a new strength to deal with them, or sometimes a creative way to resolve it.

The thing is, we can get disappointed sometimes if, when we pray, we don't get the answer we want, or the result isn't the way we thinking. Sometimes I am told that answers to prayer are merely a coincidence, but as Archbishop William Temple famously said "When I pray, coincidences happen; when I stop praying, the coincidences stop happening!" The thing is, when we ask for God to do something for us, firstly, we must ask ourselves... is it the sort of thing that God would do; is it in line with his character. If it isn't, may be we shouldn't be asking, but if it is, do we pray with even the smallest of faith that it might be fulfilled? The Bible is honest in telling us that our prayers may not always be answered, but God still cares for us even when we can't understand what's going on.

Faith is God's gift to us; faith grows as we persist in prayer. We might be asking and asking and wondering if our prayer will be answered. God is faithful, but sometimes we have to be persistent; to just keep praying. I don't know whether you have had this experience, but I think it sheds a bit of light on the issue of persistence in prayer. When my

sons were younger, they would talk about "things" they would want coming up to Christmas or birthdays. Sometimes they were just a momentary "I'd like that!" kind of request, but for some items there would be a verbalised desire for such and such that developed over weeks or months (and sometimes a year). For some prayers that we pray, I think God is the wise Father making sure we really want what we are asking for.

Sometimes we need to learn that praying isn't just praying words – it can be us just being still in God's presence. When we are still or when we are in a place where are minds are not full of stuff that's going on; God get's a chance to speak to us. If you find it difficult to be in that place, I found a great quote from Gemma Hunt in a book on "How to Pray". She says:

When I pause, I like using these three steps:

- Relax. Sit comfortably, and let go of any tension in your body.
- 2. Breathe. Take a deep breath in and a deep breath out. Keep going until you get into a nice slow rhythm.
- Smile. Say "Hello God" and wait for him to love you and smile back.

If, when you've asked God to speak about something that concerns you, don't over think or try too hard to hear Him – my experience is that he will drop a thought into your mind – often when you're doing something else, but conversations are like that, I find.

"When I pray, coincidences happen; when I stop praying, the coincidences stop happening!

I hope that you might be encouraged to try praying, again or more..... and my prayer is that you may experience many more God-incidences in your life.



The collection contains many standout poems especially in the family and love chapters: Jabberwocky by Lewis Carroll and Witch work and Orphee by Neil Gaiman are quite imaginative and make for some fun reading. Let Me Die a Youngman's Death by Roger McGough and Because I could not stop for Death by Emily Dickinson are morbidly fascinating. No poetry collection dealing with endings will be complete without Dylan Thomas's Do Not Go Gentle into That Good Night, and since the collection began with a verse from The Tempest, it is only proper that it should end with two soliloquies from Hamlet and Macbeth, To be or not to be and Tomorrow and tomorrow and tomorrow respectively. This beautifully illustrated book is indeed a great collection of good poetry, old and new. It will appeal to those true lovers of poetry and to others who perhaps only have a passing fascination with the medium. I shall certainly enjoy teaching my rather young son to start with some of these poems.

(East Norfolk Transport Users Association) is a voluntary independent body which monitors bus and rail provision in the East Norfolk Area.

n Monday 1st August, 2022 Travel Norfolk launched its new multi-operator bus ticket. The day ticket (known as the Norfolk Fusion Day ticket) costs just £12 for an adult, £9 for a young person (5-19) or £22 for a group (2 adults, 3 young people) and can be purchased on board the bus or via the bus operators App.

The day ticket allows passengers to use all buses run by all bus operators (there are 16 operators servicing this county) across Norfolk and is an ideal solution for those who want to use buses to explore much further afield.

An adult £12 ticket allows travel anywhere across Norfolk and the £22 group ticket is exceptional value for money.

Such improvements for bus travel have been made possible through the Norfolk Enhanced Partnership which was formed in March, 2022. The Partnership is responsible for delivering the measures and schemes set out in the `Bus Service Improvement Plan` published in October, 2021.

ENTUA welcomes any initiatives which promote increased use of public transport, but views this as aimed at the leisure market, whereas we are keen to promote services in areas where no current service exists for passengers to access educational, employment, medical and shopping facilities. While still on buses, ENTUA has learnt that `First Bus` have been in talks with the Government about a potential fares cap of £2.00 per journey that could come into force later this year. The plan designed as a response to the `cost of living` crisis has reportedly been worked on by Downing Street since April, but it is not known whether the country`s new Prime Minister will take this forward when they take over from Boris Johnson. If the fare cap were introduced, it would be in operation for six months commencing in October. The price cap would not apply to long distance coach services or in Scotland and Wales.

ENTUA welcomes this proposal as it would not only help existing bus users, but would also offer car users an alternative mode of transport, particularly in light of the high cost of fuel. As we have stated in previous articles, passenger numbers are not yet up to pre-Covid levels and anything that helps increase passenger numbers will go towards safeguarding services when the current Government Covid relief payments expire in October.

Latest info suggests that bus patronage is at 85% of pre-Covid levels so there is still some way to go to reach the point where bus services are paying their way.

With regard to trains – Greater Anglia regularly publishes its performance figures to stake-holders including information on services during periods of industrial action and updates on service enhancements. As at 6th August, 2022, performance with punctuality

across the network averaged 94.2%.

Most of the enhancements are concerned with station upgrades Frinton-on-Sea, platform lengthening at stations between Broxbourne and Hertford East to accommodate 10 carriage trains and the introduction of Class 720 electric trains on the West Anglia services. More locally to us are the installation of new station signs at Oulton Broad South promoting access by train to Carlton Marshes which was funded by the East Suffolk Lines Community Rail Partnership in partnership with



Greater Anglia and Suffolk Wildlife Trust. The signs read `Oulton Broad South – for Carlton Marshes`. The new visitor centre is just a 15 minute walk from the station.

Dates for industrial action have been notified for August and unless the disputes are settled there will probably be more in September. If the same format is followed as for previous days of industrial action, Greater Anglia will only be able to operate 10% of its services, which means they will only operate direct services with reduced frequency and limited hours between Norwich-

London, Colchester-London stopping services and Southend Victoria to London Services. There will be no local services between Norwich-Cambridge/Stansted Airport, Sheringham, Lowestoft and Great Yarmouth or Lowestoft-Ipswich.
