s well as elections for all Great Yarmouth Borough Councillors there will be elections on May 4th for local Parish Councils, all members of Bradwell, Burgh Castle, Belton with Browston and Fritton with St. Olaves Councils are up for election on the same day.

CANDIDATES - Nomination forms are now available online and paper copies can also be sent out if required by the Electoral Services Manager at GYBC (telephone 01493 846327). Completed nomination papers are to be taken to the Town Hall between Monday 27th March, and no later than Thursday 4th April. Any papers submitted after this date will not be accepted. Nomination papers must be delivered in person by the

candidate, proposer or seconder. An appointment must be made with a member of the elections team so the nomination papers can be checked. **VOTERS** - Also new and very important from these elections voters will now be required to show photo ID when voting at any elections, passport, driver's license, bus passes are amongst the list of documents that will be accepted. For those without these types of ID a verification certificate can be applied for online for information call 08003230280 or visit



electoralcommiission.org.uk/voterID. Residents must be registered to vote by Monday 17th April.

Belton with Browston Parish Council

The latest meeting of Belton with Browston Parish Council was held on February 7th with nine Parish Councillors present along with Borough Councillor Adrian Myers, Tracy Cameron, a



Borough & Parish Councillor was also present and the Parish Clerk Kate Ruddock, Ken Botwright chaired the meeting.

In Planning the following applications have been approved by the Borough Council, Dove Cottage, Station Road South (Listed building works), Pipistrelle Barn, Beccles Road, Belton (single story building for pool and gym) and 3 Amhurst Gardens (garage extension and porch alterations). There were no objections from councillors for the following: - 1 Beccles Road, Belton (Demolition of garden room/construction of annex), Borrowdale, Sandy Lane, Belton (replace brick garage with timber), Ashmar House, Farman Close (works to tree with TPO). With regard to a change of use from residential domestic to a residential institution at 14 Broome Gardens, this was considered as not suitable for the village with insufficient parking as a further reason. There was one further application for land south of Manor Farm Cottage at Browston a request for outline permission for three properties with relocation of stables. This was objected to as outside the development area and being in a Tertiary settlement with a long list of further reasons why it should not be approved. Th parish council's comments against sites submitted

to the Borough Council by landowners for possible future development during the lifetime of the extended Boroughwide Local Plan were agreed

At the New Road Centre comments are awaited from the Football Foundation on proposals to convert two of the changing rooms into a second, smaller meeting room whilst a new gas contract was agreed, quotations for weed killer application will be obtained before the possibility of in-house training for the caretaker is taken further. The Council will look at other events and ways of commemorating the Kings coronation, rather than an event at New Road, the planting of trees or a commemorative bench purchase will be considered.

The chairman reported on progress with the Neighbourhood Plan for the three local parishes including Belton and urged people to return the questionnaires either on line or from paper copies in Village Voice February edition.

Parish Councillors are now the trustees of the Belton Poor's lands Charity after the resignation of the previous trustees, separate meetings will be held for this fund.

The next meetings of the Council take place at the New Road Sport and Leisure Centre on Tuesdays March 7th and April 4th with the Annual Parish Meeting on Tuesday May 9th and Annual Parish Council Meeting on Tuesday May16th all commencing at 7.30pm, details from the Parish Clerk, Kate Ruddock on 01493 602960 or email beltonparish@yahoo.co.uk.

VILLAGE VOICE MARCH 2023 **Burgh Castle** Parish Council Burgh Castle council had previously objected to the original building. Members

Il seven members of the Parish Council plus Borough Councillor Adrian Myers, two members of the public and the Parish Clerk attended the February 13th meeting of Burgh Castle Parish Council, Brian Swan was in the chair.

Members were unanimously against the plans to alter two journeys on the Service 5 bus, in school term time from March 13th the two mid-afternoon trips will run the opposite way round the village and miss out Mill Road to terminate in Belton with no return trips to Gorleston and Great Yarmouth. The Chairman had already written to ENTUA and Norfolk County Councill on the matter and Councillor Myers agreed to take up the issue, everyone felt that a separate service should be provided for Lynn Grove High School without depleting the parishes services.

Several planning responses had gone in earlier including no objections to alterations at Burghwell House on Market Road and further amendments to the former Post Office site development, there had been a raft of reasons to object to proposals to



change the newly built garage behind 6 Coronation Terrace into a residential family annexe, the present were against the size of the proposed 5 bedroomed house planned as a replacement to the

bungalow known as The Lodge at Church Farm. Whilst it was difficult to object to plans for conversions of agricultural buildings to residential at two sites on Market Road (behind Burghwell lodge three dwellings and to the rear of Breydon View two dwellings) safety aspects of access to and from both sites were raised. Generally, there was agreement to proposals for new storage bays at Welcome Pit although one councillor was against. During this last discussion it was reported that the site owners were awaiting contractors to start on the entrance improvements and that it was that company (Folkes) who had provided the new speed warning sign nearby as part of their recent planning permission (the unit is currently out of action as it had been supplied faulty by the manufacturers).

There are a large number of sites in the village submitted by land owners/developers as possible locations for future building, both residential and mixed, councillors decided to generally object with specific extra reasons for some locations, the chairman pointed out that the Borough Council had yet to decide on which of these specific sites would be included in the period to 2041 but overall in the Borough more sites had been submitted than would be needed

The works to tidy up the grassed area by the village sign should be started by Norfolk County Council on March 13th. members agreed to write to Norfolk Archaeological Trust to express their concerns over the continued flooding of the car park entrance, several councillor's had received complaints about the situation. It was agreed to write to Norfolk County Council to complain that a lot of edging strips are missing from the riverside boardwalk whilst some of the others have warped out of line.

burghcastleclerk@gmail.com. Please note that both the April and May meetings, the latter to include the Annual Parish Meeting, will be on the third Monday of the month due to Easter and the Kings coronation being on our usual meeting dates.

A Word from your Local MP & Councillor

MP writes

It's unusual to have a piece of news that everyone seems to be talking about. But for the best part of a week the World War Two bomb, unearthed during the construction of the Third River crossing, was the talk of the town. And it even provided a small snippet for the news bulletins after it detonated somewhat unexpectedly.

"It went off with an almighty bang!" That's how someone close to the site described it to me moments after the explosion. It certainly was an almighty bang as some heard it in the Belton and Fritton areas, although I didn't hear a thing whilst I was out walking my dog in the north of the constituency.

I visited the site the following week and was surprised at the limited extent of damage. That is a testament to the professionalism of the armed services team that took all measures to protect lives and property. They worked alongside our local police team and civil authorities to coordinate the emergency response. This response included road closures, the evacuation from properties within the exclusion zone, and the setting up of a centre to provide facilities for evacuated residents. I want to thank all of those that contributed to this amazing effort.

Without this level of expertise, and detailed co-ordination, things could have been very different. That's why I've joined fellow Norfolk MPs to lobby the Home Secretary to rethink plans to cut funding to the county's Urban Search and Rescue Team (USAR). It was established in 2006, with others across the country, as a response to the 9/11 terrorist attacks. In an emergency they are designed to provide a critical response to vital, nationally important, infrastructure sites and centres of urban population. The Norfolk service is at risk following a Home Office decision to reduce funding by more than £800,000.

The specialist urban and research teams are about more than responding to acts of terror. They are there to provide back-up during any large-scale emergency whatever the nature. If the communities in and around Great Yarmouth experienced catastrophic coastal inundation or flooding, we would rely on the USAR to save lives and homes. They would respond to major road or rail accidents. Any delayed response, because teams had to travel from further afield, would risk lives and exacerbate any knock-on disruption that impacts on residents, business and damages our local economy. They would have been on standby to respond if the detonation of the riverside bomb had had a different catastrophic outcome.

What might be, to officials, a convenient short-term savings creates an unnecessary vulnerability for our area. And in the longer-term that would have much greater financial costs. I am hoping the Home Secretary will look at this and order an urgent rethink.



The adaptation of the No. 5 bus service to accommodate the students is to my mind something of a fudge and needs to be sorted out properly. I will keep you updated.

aking a walk around The Rectory garden is a delight at this time of year. There are swathes of snowdrops like a white carpet in parts of the garden. I know I am very fortunate to enjoy such beauty, and I am thankful to Tim who cleared all the leaves under the trees so that the signs of spring are more visible.

What is it that makes these flowers give such pleasure? I remember my Mum used to come in from the garden all excited to report to my Nanny the sight of the first snowdrop, crocus or daffodil. For me it is the hope of Spring; longer and warmer days and the end of the dark and cold longer nights. It is also a reminder that out of what appears to be death, life returns. The bulbs, which appear to die off each year, are back once again. I have flowers in the garden that I have received in pots in previous years that I've planted and they return year on year to give more pleasure.

Later this month it will be Mothers Day (or Mothering Sunday) however you choose to remember it.

My Mum passed away some years ago but it is always a delight to visit her grave with a pot of bulbs and see the flowers from previous years brightening that little piece of earth. I am thankful for my Mum and all she meant to me and did for me, but also thankful to God that she is in a much better place and like the bulbs, appearing to be dead, but bursting forth in resurrection life; which is the Christian hope. The whole of March is taken up with Lent, which began on February 22nd this year. For those of us who mark this Lenten time of year, it is a time to have a look at the way in

> which our life is flourishing (or not) and to consider when needs to be done to enable our lives to flourish and be fruitful; it is a time of clearing the ground and planting new seeds, if I continue with the gardening analogy.

For some it will mean spending less time watching TV or on social media, but instead finding space to read a Christian book, or the Bible. Others might choose to take on something positive, such as 40 acts of kindness, or set aside the money they might usually spend on sweets/chocolate to go towards a charity supporting people in need, such as Ukraine or the Turkey & Syria Earthquake appeal. In the past, Lent was kicked off by Shrove Tuesday

when all the rich foods were eaten up, and then not eaten until Easter Day some 45 days later. Lent was a time for fasting and preparation in readiness to celebrate Easter Day. Hot cross buns were enjoyed on Good Friday and Easter Sunday was a real fest day. Nowadays, hot cross buns and Cadburys cream Easter eggs are available all year round.

Whatever we believe, and however we choose to travel through Lent, I would recommend this time as a perfect opportunity to think about some of those big questions of life; to reassess where you are and how you are travelling. For Christians, it is a time to reconsider how faithful and obedient we are as followers of Jesus, to bring to God our failures and wrong life-choices, and to receive the forgiveness and encouragement that God so longs to give; and his help to live lives that bless our friends and neighbours. Seeing a life well-lived is just like discovering a patch of spring flowers vibrant in colour and standing firm and growing despite the odds.

As a church we at All Saints Belton have been talking about what might be arranged as a celebration of the coronation of King Charles III.

The coronation itself is taking place on the Saturday morning. It is suggested that various social events might happen on the Sunday and then the Monday be used for Community activities such a litter picks, working on improving a community area, etc. I wonder what Belton and Burgh Castle would like to do?



It is likely that the church will organise a Coronation Tea on the Saturday or Sunday afternoon. Greater Anglia have been achieving good performance on their services and state "Punctuality across their Network achieved 96.6% in week ending 5th February, 2023"

Greater Anglia go on to say: "It was also reassuring that the very good performance was achieved for all parts of the region they serve, so by 17th September, 2022 the moving annual average performance for the different service groups was 94.7% for Great Eastern main line services, 94.6% for Inter City services, 91.3% for Stansted Express services, 94.6% for regional services and 93.5% for West Anglia services resulting in 93.6% for Greater Anglia as a whole"

NORMAL BUS TIMETABLES RESUMED

We have been advised by First Eastern Counties that the temporary timetables in place since 12th September, 2022 will cease from11th March, 2023 and from 12th March, 2023 normal timetables will be resumed.

BUS SERVICE FOR BELTON STUDENTS TO LYNN GROVE ACADEMY

For a number of years ENTUA has been highlighting the need for a bus service for Belton students attending



Lynn Grove Academy on behalf of the parents of the Belton students. Currently there are 91 students attending this Academy from Belton and while there has been an early morning 6B leaving Belton at 0735 (Bracon Road) which drops off at the Millwood Surgery stop, there has been no return service in the afternoons.

First Eastern Counties and Norfolk County Council have put forward a proposal that will see a Service 5 calling at the bus stop near Lynn Grove at 1412 and 1517 travelling via Burgh Castle Queens Head and due to arrive in Belton Bracon Road at 1430 and 1535. These buses will not travel completely around Belton as the timings do not permit. After calling at the Kings Head, it travels along New Road TURNING RIGHT into Bracon Road where there is a bus stop, it will then turn right into Station Road North then St. Johns Road and Waveney Drive where it will terminate.

These afternoon times for Service 5 are in place for school days only. On non-school days and Saturdays Service 5 will only operate around Burgh Castle. (A separate timetable exists for Sundays and Public Holidays).

This is being done to accommodate the needs of the Belton students at the request of the parents, but will, of course, have an adverse effect for Burgh Castle passengers who will have no return bus to Great Yarmouth between 1317 and 1637 (Queens Head timing). There will also be no Service 5 connection for Cherry Tree Holiday Centre between these times.

The Service 5 alterations will take effect from Monday 13th March, 2023. So from this date students travelling to Lynn Grove Academy should use the 6B departing Bracon Road at 0735 (Waveney Drive 0740) and alight at the stop adjacent to Millwood Surgery in Bradwell – the

Academy is a short walk from here. For return journeys in the afternoons Service 5 picks

up in Burgh Road between Claydon Grove and Wren Drive at 1412 and 1517 calling at Burgh Castle Queens Head at 1423 and 1528, then Burgh Castle Louis Dahl at 1425 and 1530 arriving at Belton Bracon Road at 1430 and 1535 then via Station Road North, St. Johns Road arriving at Waveney Drive at 1433 and 1538 where it terminates. (NB Timings do not allow these buses to go around the whole of Belton as they have to get back to Market Gates to take up their next duty).

So now it is up to you, a solution has been put in place for a bus linking Lynn Grove from Belton in both directions. This has been done at the expense of Service 5 users on other parts of its route. Remember the old adage 'Use it or lose it'. It will be kept under review, so if you really need this service make sure it is used.
