Belton with Browston Parish Council

The latest meeting of Belton with **Browston Parish** Council was held on April 4th with ten Parish Councillors present along with Borough



Councillor Adrian Myers, two members of the public and the Parish Clerk Kate Ruddock, Ken Botwright chaired the meeting.

In planning there were no objections to plans for a swimming pool and gym at Pipistrelle Barn, Hall Farm, Beccles Road, Belton but a request will be made that it only be used for residents use with no holiday B&B, or Air B&B use. The following applications have been approved by the Borough Council - 9 St. James Crescent (demolition of conservatory and construct a new side extension) and Ashmar House, Farman Close, (removal of lower stump of tree covered by a TPO). The Borough have refused permission to convert and extend the existing garage at Brentwood on St. Johns Road and construct a new garage and the applicant has withdrawn the application at 14 Broom Gardens for a change of use from residential to a residential institution.

The Parish Council has obtained a guotation from a local contractor to clear Back Lane at Belton of undergrowth, the lane has been subject to a lack of maintenance by Norfolk County Council who have now agreed to pay for the work to be undertaken.

Electric vehicle charging points were discussed, if installed at the New Road Centre, the Parish Council would not have to pay for installation or maintenance but would not receive any income therefore it was agreed to submit an expression of non-committal interest at this stage and to seek further information.

Councillor Myers reported that no new play equipment is scheduled for the Bell Lane site, however white lines on the multiplay area will be remarked, the seating will be repainted along with the cradle swings and two flat swings will be altered to cradle swings. Councillor Light reported that the set of goal posts donated by Bohemians F.C will be installed on Bell Lane in the near future.

Photos of various road surfaces in need of repair have been sent to Norfolk County Highways including New Road, Councillor Staff stated that he had been contacted by a resident about the terrible condition of the New road surface

The Defibrillator at the New Road Centre is now on the outside fence (by the main entrance) and is therefore available 24/7 whilst the possibility of midweek fund raising car boot sales at that location is being investigated by the Parish Council.

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING – The Belton and Browston Annual Parish Meeting, when local groups have the opportunity to report on the year and the Citizen Of The Year award is presented takes place at the New Road Sport and Leisure Centre on Tuesday May 9th (7.30pm) all local residents are invited to attend.

nere were six members of the Parish Council plus Borough Councillor Adrian Myers, one

member of the public and the Parish Clerk at the April 17th meeting of Burgh Castle Parish Council, Brian Swan was in the chair.

In planning updated documents for the use of the recently built building behind 6 Coronation Terrace as residential for a family member did not alter the Councils view that it was totally against this building when constructed and did not approve of its use for residential purposes. Regarding a request for part of the garage at Greenancres on Marsh Lane as a residential annexe members asked for conditions to include its use for a family member related to the owners of the main property to be applied, they also agreed to ask if any agricultural tenancy restrictions apply to the use of the property as a whole. The Broads Authority have approved demolition of The Lodge at Church Farm (Church Road) and its replacement with a two storey house with garage while the Borough Council have refused prior approval permission for agricultural buildings to be converted into two residential properties at Breydon View on Market Road.

There had only been a basic reply from the County Council Highways Engineer saying he was awaiting contractors comments over the Parish Councils complaints about the quality of workmanship on the recent verge works near the village sign. There has been no reply from The Norfolk Archaeological trust over the continued flooding at the Roman Fort car park entrance while councillors have been made aware of at least three members of the public being charged £100 for parking discrepancies at the site in recent weeks, concerns have been



raised over the efficiency of the parking machine, members agreed to display notices in the village stating that the Parish Council has no responsibility for this site, it is managed by Norfolk Archaeological trust for English Heritage.

Members agreed to ask the Borough Council to undertake a litter pick in High Road, Mill Road and Butt Lane and to ask the Brownies if they would be able to do one on Back Lane as they had discussed this with Councillor Greenacre last year and members felt that this is a safer location for them.

The Chairman advised that he had been in touch with ENTUA who are waiting official user figures from First Bus over the lack of take up of the reversed afternoon service 5 busses by pupils of Lynn Grove High School, parents had said that the service was needed by 90 children in Belton, in the first three weeks none were seen using the first trip with the second run, in Burgh Castle about 3.30pm only seeming to have a maximum of three Belton pupils on any one day. Also, on busses members agreed to add the Parish Councils name to a letter being put together by Postwick Parish Council to go the Norfolk County Council to request the reinstatement of the Postwick Park and Ride service as soon as possible.

In May there are two meetings in one evening again a week late, due to the bank holiday they will be on Monday May 15th, the Annual Parish Meeting commencing at 7.30pm followed at approximately 7.45pm by the Annual Parish Council Meeting both at the Village Hall on Church Road. DOGS THAT BARK AT THE DOOR

Does your Dog bark at the door?

This is a very common issue for many dog loving households. Barking at the door means that a dog is trying to create distance between them (or their house) and whoever it is at the door. This is their first warning that they might escalate their behaviour further if the intruder does not back off. This might be triggered when hearing a car door close, footsteps outside, seeing someone approaching through a window, on hearing the letter box, doorbell or knocking. It is also common for this behaviour to occur when the dog is in their own garden with people walking past. For some dog owners it is not an issue but for most it is. In some cases, the barking will turn into behaviour we do not like to see resulting in bites. A classic victim of this is delivery people as they are unknown to the dog and have a job to do so walk directly up to the house.

Did you know you could end up in Prison for 5 years?

In 2020 a high court judge ruled that dog owners could face up to five years in prison if their dog attacked a postal worker. This was the result of a Royal Mail worker being bitten by a dog with no history of aggression but clearly reacted to the door. The worker unfortunately lost the top of a finger whilst delivering a letter as the dog grabbed and bit down onto their fingers. A prison sentence is also possible if a dog were to bite any person. If a dog is deemed out of control without biting a prison sentence can still be imposed. Controlling dogs in public includes private places such as your own home or garden under legislation. A dog can be classed as out of control even if someone is only worried that a dog might injure them or potentially their animal.

5 Ways to prevent barking at the door

Here are some ways you can prevent or help with barking at the door. If you are already experiencing aggression on top of the barking, you would benefit from professional guidance.

1) Ask visitors to call ahead: whilst you are trying to get over the door issues ask visitors to call ahead of their arrival. Let them know you are training your dog and ask them to avoid ringing the doorbell.

2) Teach an alternative behaviour: teach your dog when they hear the door to go onto their bed, for a good example of this. If your dog already reacts to the doorbell a good tip is to change the sound of the bell and start from scratch.

3) Knocking means nothing: teach your dog that when they hear knocking it doesn't mean they need to charge at the door to anticipate a visitor.

4) Avoid vigilance: if your dog likes sitting and watching out of windows or pacing the parameter of the garden fence this needs to be interrupted. This is your cue that your dog is going to bark at someone, and they need to be redirected to another activity OR prevented from having access to these areas.

5) Get a post box: if your dog already has an issue with postal workers, get a post box so they don't hear the letter box going every day. This keeps everyone safe including your dog. These are just the basic outlines, read more about helping with this issue on the blog. 

Dear residents.

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We are now in Purdah. This is a preelection period where certain restrictions are put on the media regarding elections. What this means

regarding my article in the Village Voice is as follows. Village Voice cannot allow articles that make references to individual politicians, continue third party blogs or articles of a political nature (like mine), show any preference for a political party, allow any politician to make statements that could be seen as electioneering or on controversial matters, publicise proactive events involving candidates unless it is to advertise a hustings event in which all candidates are invited.

Consequently, I cannot make any statements as to my activities within the villages over the last few weeks. Given that, I would say, that in this election, you have two votes in the Lothingland ward which will be represented by two elected borough council candidates. Voter I.D. is required and a list of acceptable I.D.s can be found at the council's website. This comes under elections Act 2022: Voter ID requirements.

USEFUL INFORMATION ABOUT BENEFITS 2023 -24

Changes to benefits if you're working age

If you haven't yet reached State Pension age, or you're a couple and one of you is yet to reach State Pension age, you might be entitled to benefits for working-age people.

Changes to Disability Living Allowance (DLA)

The weekly rates for both the care and mobility components have increased.

Changes to Employment and Support Allowance (ESA) This has increased to £84.80 per week if you're single and £133.30 per week if you're a couple.

Changes to Income Support

This has increased to £84.80 per week if you're single and £133.30 per week if you're a couple.

Changes to Jobseeker's Allowance (JSA) This has increased to £84.80 per week if you're single and £133.30 per week if you're a couple.

Changes to Personal Independence Payment (PIP)

The daily living component has increased to £68.10 for the standard rate and £101.75 for the enhanced rate. The mobility component has increased to £26.90 for the standard rate and £71.00 for the enhanced rate.

Changes to Universal Credit

The basic standard allowances for Universal Credit are £368.74 per month if you're single and £578.82 per month if you're a couple.

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ALL SAINTS BELTON **Rev Rosie writes.**

t is not long now until King Charles III is crowned in Westminster Abbey, watched by hundreds of people in the church and by millions of people on television on Saturday 6th May. Yet, it is less than a year since we celebrated the Platinum Jubilee marking 70 years on the throne of the late Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II with a Jubilee Afternoon Tea on Sunday 5th June. Now, on Sunday 7th May we shall be doing it all again to mark the coronation of King Charles III, which will take place on the Saturday.

Tickets for the Right Royal Celebrations of King Charles' Coronation – the Afternoon Tea in The Rectory Garden are now on sale from Binkys, the Church and the Rectory, Burgh Castle Village Hall Tea Rooms and Bill Richmond of the JGI. Thanks to the generosity of the Village Voice grant and a donation from the trustees of the JGI, prices for this amazing event have been kept low: £3 for adults or children and £9 for a family ticket (for a maximum of 2 adults plus children). Let's hope the weather is better than last year and the sun shines on us!

So, will you be watching the Coronation on TV? I hope to do just that, preparations for the following day allowing. I've been reading about the symbolism involved in the church service, as King Charles is anointed, crowned and enthroned, and acknowledged as the Supreme Governor of the Church of England. Just as the late Queen undertook preparation for her coronation; reading bible passages and reflections prepared for her by the Archbishop of Canterbury, so Charles will undertake the same kind of preparation. It is all very similar to a priest preparing for ordination.

I am looking forward to discovering what music the King has chosen for his coronation, and to praying with the Archbishop, the King and all those present for the King's reign; that God will help the King and Queen in all they undertake on behalf of the United Kingdom and the Commonwealth. Much of the service will be as it has been since 973 and the coronation of King Edgar in Bath, but in English now, rather than Latin.

Right Royal Celebrations





Olive oil pressed from olives grown on the Mount of Olives near Jerusalem will be used to anoint the King. When his mother was anointed, a significant part of the coronation, she wore a plain white dress as a sign of humility and in recognition of her need for God's help in carrying out her duties as Queen. Kings in the Old Testament (before Jesus) were anointed with

olive oil with God's approval; Jesus' name of the Christ also means "anointed one". I believe the significant part of the coronation is when Charles is anointed, blessed and consecrated, although for many it will be when the crown is placed on his head. The King is also handed the orb - a gold globe with a cross on the top - and a sceptre, which has a cross on top too. Both are symbols of power and authority; the orb showing that the whole world is under the power of Christ's authority and the sceptre stands for earthly authority in the service of God.

The King will also be handed a Bible. At our late Queen's Coronation she was told that the Bible was more valuable than anything this world affords. The symbols and words, linked in with the music, clearly and deliberately connect the coronation with Christian themes and stories in the Bible. No doubt this will be a spectacular occasion; we do pomp and ceremony so well in the UK.

King Charles has had a long wait to become King due to his Mother's strength and good health; time to consider the important aspects of what a King should be. For me, his best example and the person to imitate would be King Jesus, who had all the power and authority and yet was prepared to serve the people around him, caring for them and transforming their lives. My prayer is that King Charles will enjoy his day and then continue to work for the good of the people and the good of the planet, in every way that is open to him.

Main issues and concerns raised

Generally, although residents are not supportive of large scale residential development, they would welcome more affordable or small-scale housing to help meet community needs, such as for younger people wanting to get on the housing ladder or to meet needs such as downsizing.

Concern was raised about future housing development taking place on Grade 1 or 2 agricultural land. There were also concerns that new development would mean a loss of countryside, natural habitats, village identity or will impact on landscape and increase traffic / road safety issues.

* Should there be future development smaller 2 or 3 bed homes were most supported. Small sites of 10-25 homes on brownfield land was preferable.

* Residents currently or likely to be looking for housing in the next 5-10 years were predominantly interested in smaller unit housing, either alone or as a couple. The cost of purchasing a property, finding the money to acquire a deposit for housing or the costs of private rent are key concerns for those looking. Some individuals on the waiting list for social housing reported long waiting times.

The design of any new housing is important, there's support for ensuring new housing is inkeeping with existing development and for it to incorporate low carbon design/energy efficient measures.

* There were mixed views on allocating land for renewable energy generation. Solar energy generation was the preferred choice, subject to it not being intrusive within the landscape, and incorporating boundary treatments such as

trees and hedgerows.

* A number of residents who are currently in employment and living in the NPA either work from home or travel outside of the NPA doing various miles (between 0-200 miles) to travel to their employment. The most popular option for getting to work was via private vehicle.

* Retaining the current rural character of the parishes is important to residents including the need to retain a gap between the villages so they do not lose their individual identities.

* There is strong support for protecting the rural environment, its tranquillity, important woodlands/wetlands, and views of the Broads, marshlands and other beauty spots. Many areas were suggested for identification as local green spaces and important local views.

* Access into the countryside is important, people would like to see more footpaths and routes into the countryside.

 Most respondents raised concerns that they did not want to see the area over developed or lose its rural identity. Concerns were raised about the strain development places on community infrastructure/services, the poor quality of new housing and traffic issues.
 In the next 10 years residents said they would like the area as safe, rural, tranguil, friendly,

attractive and unchanged.
If any employment land comes forward recidents would like to see this used for a

residents would like to see this used for a medical centre, rural enterprises, shop or retail.

* Most respondents did not want to see further mineral extraction in the NPA and reported issues on noise, vibration, and the maintenance of the roads.

* Most respondents were in favour of Lothingland having a recycling centre to alleviate the current traffic congestion issues.

Most respondents were not keen to see further expansion of tourism areas and reported concerns relating to traffic.

* Most respondents said they would like to see a bus service to Millwood Surgery.

Traffic and speeding is a common concern. Many respondents suggested the need for additional speed cameras and traffic calming measures, street lighting and safer footpaths/cycle paths.

Concerns were raised around parking, particularly outside schools at pick up / drop off times which results in parking on pavements, junctions, and outside residential dwellings.

* Retaining existing local services and facilities is important and there is some support for new amenities. This includes a GP surgery, dentist, open spaces, post office and general shop. Some of the lowest options were secondary school, sports facilities, community centre and public house. Encouragement of more facilities and activities to be introduced in the villages for all age groups was also noted including clubs for children.

* Residents stated that they were satisfied with the current public transport but would like to see an improvement to frequency, better links to schools and other areas.

There's more than one way to add vertical colour to your garden. Tall plants make an obvious choice, but so do hanging baskets. Whether you've got an expensive patio or tiny apartment balcony, a hanging basket gets plants off the ground, to eye level or higher, and can add a burst of color where flower beds and patio containers can't.

Already-planted hanging baskets are easy to find in any garden centre, but so are the materials needed to plant up your own. Here's an easy guide to creating your own hanging basket, plus tips for long-term care.

Your supplies:

* A basket - There are many options, from wood to plastic to wire frames. Larger baskets allow for more types of plants and plastic types tend to hold more moisture, but many people prefer the aesthetic appeal of wood, wicker and wire baskets.

* A liner - Most do-it-yourself basket planters have a wire frame with some sort of liner, like coco fibre, compressed sphagnum peat or sheet moss. Most liners are sold separately.

* The compost - We always recommend using a good quality compost for baskets and containers. Clover Tub & Basket we find best and contains all the nutrients needed.

* The plants - The most basic rule to remember is don't mix sunloving and shade-loving plants in the same basket. You can look for a combination of mounding plants for the centre and trailing plants for the edge. Within these two categories, you can look for interesting or colourful foliage or plants that have striking blooms. How many plants you actually put in the basket depends on a few factors. For a small 10-in. (25-cm) basket, three to four plants may do. But with a large, deep 16-in. (40-cm) moss basket, you could use as many as 10 plants - especially if you plant in holes along the sides and bottom.

If you're using a wire basket that didn't come pre-lined, line it with moss, coco fibre or other liner. If you plan on planting in the sides of the basket, you'll need to cut small slits in the lining at the compost level. wrap the plant with a paper towel and push it through the hole from the inside out.

Fill the basket with compost until it's about two-thirds full. Plant at the top and sides, filling the rest of the basket with compost mix so that it covers the root balls of the plants. Water thoroughly.

Care Tips:

* Most hanging baskets need daily watering during the warm Summer months. You can improve water retention by placing an additional poly liner or plastic saucer in the base of the basket, on top of the moss or fibre liner.

In addition to water, plants also need adequate nutrition. If your soil doesn't have fertilizer included, add a pellet form of slow-release fertilizer to the top of the basket after it's planted. You can also add fertiliser to the water daily or weekly. As always, please follow the directions on the label of every fertiliser.



* Depending on the plants you choose, you'll probably have to do a little routine maintenance to your basket to encourage continuous blooming. Deadheading or removing spent blooms will make your basket look better and allow the plants to grow and bloom longer

Does your house have historical, archaeological or architectural importance, is it aged, rare, aesthetically interesting or valued by the community?

he Neighbourhood Plan has the opportunity to afford these valuable and characterful dwellings, our Local Heritage, some protection via 'The List' which will be held by Great Yarmouth Borough Council. This is not to 'List' your house, i.e. Grade I, II*, II etc. with all the constraints that are attached. Adding your house to GYBCs 'The List' enables the protection of the key features and its contribution to the area's character. Locally listed buildings are historic buildings that have been judged to be of value to the local community. It helps owners, developers, and decision-makers recognise the building's significance, particularly how it contributes to the character and distinctiveness of the area. With buildings on the local list, special permission to start any alterations or repairs isn't usually needed. However, when works need planning permission, the local listing helps to acknowledge the historical importance of a building.

It is estimated that the following number of properties existed within the NPA in the 19th and early 20th century that still exist today. This is based on the pre 1850 Tithe map and the OS maps of 1888 and 1945. It is therefore possible that there are 330 properties that are over 75 years old, 218 that are over 130 years old and 127 that are over

170 years old.

designed to ensure that the historic and architectural interest of buildings that are of local importance, but do not meet the criteria for being nationally listed, is taken into account during the planning process. Buildings that may be included in a Local List are those that do not quite meet the criteria for being Nationally Listed, but which are still of architectural or historical importance in their local area.

Buildings or sites in the area added to 'The List' are those that make a positive contribution to the local character and sense of place because of their Heritage Value.

Heritage Assets include buildings, monuments, sites, places, areas or parks, gardens and other designed landscapes identified as having a degree of significance meriting consideration in planning decisions, because of its heritage interest.

The Neighbourhood Plan Area includes: Belton, Browston, Burgh Castle, Fritton and St Olaves.

Extension of £2.00 maximum single fare period

As mentioned in the April ENTUA article the £2.00 maximum single bus fare period has been extended to 30th June, 2023. This represents extremely good value for money, particularly if you travel a longer distance e.g. £4.00 if you travel to Norwich and back. The Government are supporting this via the DFT to assist passengers during this period of cost of living crisis and to encourage greater bus use back to prepandemic levels. All of the Norfolk Bus operators are taking part in the scheme.

£14.7m funding will bring 70 zero emission buses to Norwich


You may be aware through local media outlets that Norfolk County Council and First Eastern Counties have received confirmation of an extra £11.4 million funding from the Department for Transport (DFT) which will mean a total of 70 zero emission buses will be arriving in Norwich next year. This, in addition to the £3.3 million confirmed in March, 2022 bringing the total funding to £14.7 million for the County's bus network. Piers Marlow, Managing Director at First East of England said – "This additional funding will allow us to electrify our five most frequent cross-city routes, accounting for nearly 2/3rds of all our bus journeys operating through Castle Meadow. This significant joint investment will provide a benefit for our passengers whilst contributing toward improving the air quality in the City. It will also see one of our two Norwich Depots (Roundtree Way depot) fully converted to operate an entirely zero emission fleet, with the installation of associated charging infrastructure and removal of all diesel related equipment".

"We continue to work closely with Norfolk County Council and other stakeholders to deliver improvements to bus services across our networks, and progress the decarbonisation of our bus fleets across the region".

There will be 55 double-deckers and 15 single-decker zero emission buses on the following routes:-

	 routes 11/12 routes 23/24 routes 21/22 	Double deckers
Blue line	- routes 25/26	
Green line	 routes 14/15 } 	Single deckers

The switch from conventional diesel engine buses to electric would reduce C02 emissions by more than 80,000 tonnes – which is equivalent to taking around 4700 small petrol cars off the road. It will also save 32 tonnes of NO and PM2.5 every year. These are the fine particles and other exhaust gases known to reduce air quality and harm peoples' health.



Other areas we have been campaigning for are:-

- 1. A year round service to the Town's railway station
- 2. A regular bus service to Gapton Hall retail park, and
- 3. A service linking Belton to Bradwell and Bradwell direct to the James Paget Hospital.

On the Gapton Hall retail park issue, Norfolk County Council are awaiting the opening of the 'Herring Bridge' to see what effect this has on traffic congestion at Gapton Hall roundabout. With regards to the station, they are undertaking a feasibility study to see if it is possible for either the X1/X11 buses to stop outside the station or for a bus interchange on North Quay (where the current second-hand car lot is situated). With regards to a service linking Belton to Bradwell to allow access to Doctors' surgeries, Norfolk County Council have taken away our suggestions and will discuss these with First Eastern Counties. To be honest we were disappointed that nothing more positive came from the meeting, bearing in mind we lodged our wish list with Norfolk County Council in 2021.

Just a reminder to Belton students using Service 5 to get home from Lynn Grove Academy, that this service is using Burgh Road again and not the diversionary route via Beccles Road to Mallard Way.
