Your Parish Council Reports

Belton with Browston Parish Council

The latest meeting of Belton with Browston Parish Council was held on June 6th with five Parish Councillors and two members of the public present, (apologies were



accepted from Borough Councillor Graham Carpenter, County Councillor Carl Annison and Parish Councillor David Mills), the meeting was chaired by Ken Botwright and during the meeting Cheryl Gay and Gemma Searby (who were both also present), were co-opted to give the Council 8 members, there are still five further vacancies and co-option details are available from the Parish Clerk (contact details at the end of these notes). Members agreed to leave the formation of working parties till the July council meeting.

The Chairman reported that he is still waiting for an announcement from the Government over if funding will continue into 2023/24 to enable the work on the Neighbourhood Plan for the three local parishes to proceed.

Regarding the New Road Field, it will not be known till the end of June if Belton FC will have a team in 2023/24. The Football Foundation have been contacted about dogs on the field, some football supporters have been bringing them on during matches. There are issues with the new top soil put on to their pitch by Bohemians FC, the fist large batch was contaminated with glass and rubble and despite promises this had not all been removed before the second delivery, the team are to be contacted about this.

There are proposals to convert two changing rooms and a referees room at New Road into a second function room which the Football Foundation have agreed to, a structural survey has confirmed that this is possible

however a change to electric water heating for showers rather than gas is not possible due to the potential drain on the electricity if all the showers were used at the same time. After discussion it was also agreed to look at the alternative options of extending the existing function room and the possibility of some electric showers being installed.

Members did not approve a request for from Belton Singers for a grant of £250 towards expenses however it was agreed to offer them the free use of the New Road hall on one Friday every month for six months.

In planning there were no objections to plans for a single storey side extension at The Manor Barn on Browston Lane although conditions were requested restricting use and banning any sale separate to the main property. There were also no objections to proposals for single story extensions at Belton Scout Hut or for conversion and front extension to an existing garage at 15 Minsmere Road, both these subject to any neighbours objections.

Councillor Barber reported that he had attended one of the Wednesday coffee mornings at the JGI, comments included, requests for a bus route from the village to Gapton Hall retail park, a roundabout at Belton Cross Roads, concerns as to future maintenance of the Nursery Close play area if GYBC move the existing play equipment and a request for occasional Parish Council meetings to be held at the JGI.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will take place at the New Road Centre on Tuesday July 4th (7.30pm), details are available from the Parish Clerk, Kate Ruddock on 01493 602960 or email beltonparish@yahoo.co.uk.

here were six members of the Parish Council plus four members of the public and the Parish Clerk at the Meeting of Burgh Castle Parish Council on June 12th. Also present was Steve Titterington who had been a Councillor up to the May elections, he was co-opted back on to the Council to bring it back to its full strength of seven members, Brian Swan chaired the meeting.

The four members of the public were all present to ask the Parish Council why they had requested that the afternoon service 5 bus runs that have been altered to serve Lynn Grove High School should be stopped. The chairman explained that with only three or four pupils using the second trip and usually none on the first run the Council felt that the service should be returned to its normal round-trip route as previously, in discussions Councillors agreed that in principle they were not against the school having a service but not at the expense of Burgh Castle residents. With the school now becoming the main catchment school for Belton pupils it was agreed that the Council would contact the school to express their support for a service to the two villages but as an addition to the existing service 5.

In planning members had no objections to proposals to change the finish on the walls on the replacement property at The Lodge at Church Farm on Church Road to flint. Members were still against proposals for Dog Training field at land on Mill Road, still concerned about the surface to the parking area and also, although the entrance has been moved in the latest drawings, the details of the splay and surface materials were not shown. At Breydon Water Holiday Park plans to replace their touring site with 33 static caravans were met with concerns over the ability of the sewage system to cope with extra demand, as there are regular issues with the Porters Loke Pumping station. Proposals to convert the garage to annex accommodation at Greenacres on Marsh lane have been approved by the Broads Authority.

The chairman reported that the recent road closures at Stepshort had been caused by the 85 year old mains electricity cable

failing, the latter also causing the pumping station there to fail and raw sewage to escape into the dyke, Councillor Hogg had reported this to the Environment Agency, both the Chairman and Borough Councillor Carpenter, who had been liaising with UK Power Networks fear that this could be the start of a run of problems with the cable. Regarding the Porters Loke sewage pumping station Councillor Grimmer reported that Anglian Water had ben undertaking some work but he did not know details.


At the Burial Ground there were still issues with moles damaging plots and the Pest Controller had been called back for the third time the previous week, also there were issues that day with the strimming and although there had not been problems previously the contractors will be contacted. Finally at the Burial Ground a large tree had been ring cut to kill the ivy and the waste skip compound gate had been repaired by Waveney Fencing.

The Chairman is trying to help 'Heart to Heart' find a suitable location for the defibrillator that was on the Kingfisher site as the site owners had requested that it be removed.

DOGS AND DIGGING

It's that time of year where we are all spending more time in the garden, but is your dog digging up your lawn? I am often asked why dogs dig and what can be done about it, here are some ideas.

WHY DO DOGS DIG

First let's explore why they dig, there are a few reasons.

- ► Heat when trying too cool down so dig into the cooler earth or because they are cold and are trying to create shelter.
- Play investigating their area, unearthing interesting objects like tree roots, or burying their own objects.
- Scent to leave their own scent or to dig a scent that is already there to explore the smell further. This can also be seen in milder form when a dog scratches with their back legs after elimination.
- Seeking trying to find something they remember is there or can smell is there such as a mole.
- Attention they are bored and have learned it gets them attention.

Some breeds are also natural diggers due to what their original breeding was intended for. Small terrier breeds for example that were used to seek out small animals.

HOW TO HELP WITH DIGGING

If your dog is naturally inclined to dig, they will find a way, it is easier to work with them than against them. If you have a prized area of the garden you don't want to be messed with it is better to stop them from accessing that area with some fencing. If digging is an issue for you supervised garden access is also a good idea along with teaching a very reliable come cue. The answer to how you can help your digging dog might also rest on the why of it, so which type of digger do you have from above?

- Heat when it is hot provide other options, cool fans, paddling pools with water, cool mats, cool coats, wet towels, sand pit with wet sand placed in the shade. Water pools can have toys in a few treats for them to fish for. If it is to do with cold, using a dog coat, a nest type bed for them to snuggle into.
- Play interactive toys and puzzle toys can be very helpful, utilising enrichment methods to keep them occupied. A simple google of canine enrichment will bring up a list of cheap options. You might also consider interactive toys such as a doggie flirt pole (think big cat toy) where you can initiate games of chase.
- Scent and seeking scatter feed treats around your lawn and other areas you are happy for them to access using some of their daily meal allowance. Burying items in an area you are happy with; this can be a child's sand pit or troughs with dirt in to help avoid digging in your garden.
- Attention increasing general enrichment and interactive play with your dog will help GET with this aspect.

A word from your Local MP & Councillor

The workings of the House of Commons can seem arcane and somewhat mysterious. Constituents are often surprised that if a Member of Parliament wishes to raise an issue it isn't simply a matter of standing up and speaking. Television coverage shows the familiar sight of MPs bobbing up and down in between contributions, all hoping to "catch the

Speaker's eye" and be called to speak.

There is no guarantee that you will get the opportunity to ask your question or make a speech. That is why at the end of each business day there is a short adjournment debate selected by ballot. This allows politicians to raise any topic they wish, assuming their name is pulled out the hat. Last month, I was lucky and called to debate an issue that is extremely important - small businesses and their vital role contributing to the Great Yarmouth economy.

Supporting local business has always been central to my political philosophy. I am fascinated by visits to businesses across the Great Yarmouth constituency and I am interested in their ideas as to how Government can support them. Likewise, I always want to know what measures ministers can take to reduce any bureaucratic burdens making it easier to operate.

Too often, politicians rush to make new laws or introduce extra regulations rather than saying "what can we remove or stop to make life easier". So, it comes as no surprise to read in the newspapers that a future Labour government would immediately end the granting of new licenses for oil and gas drilling in the North Sea. Cloaked in the guise of environmental policy Keir Starmer's party are attempting to hide their deeply anti-business beliefs.

Alongside the tourism sector, our local economy is reliant on the energy sector. There are numerous companies that are at the forefront of the industry and many smaller enterprises that provide goods and services to the sector. We had a procession of Labour MPs, including Starmer, campaign in Great Yarmouth before the local elections. I wonder how many of them told people they planned to introduce a policy that would impede business and put numerous local jobs at risk.



Well, the roadworks at Stepshort at the end of last month, caused some consternation among residents, particularly on Facebook. All the signs said 'Road Closed' when it was open! Not

the first time this has happened. All I'm going to say on this is, I cannot understand the mentality of people that actually move the road closed signs/cones to get through. I shouldn't think insurance companies would be too keen to pay out should a mishap occur after such behaviour.

For those interested, this was UK Power Networks repairing some electrical infrastructure under the road. This was done fairly quickly but the reinstatement of the road wasn't done until several days later for some reason. I did have a right ol' moan to them and suddenly it was done!

'No Mow May' was with us last month and I didn't get any complaints about the length of the grass locally, so this appeared generally accepted by most and now the Council are setting about getting things cut. This will not happen overnight so please be patient. Having said that, if you see the length of grass causing a road hazard by limiting visibility, making junctions dangerous to navigate safely, then please let me know and I'll get on it straight away. That's all for this month. Best regards.


Cubs



Extension of £2.00 single bus fare cap

The Government is extending the maximum £2.00 single bus fare cap from the end of June, 2023 through to 31st October, 2023. This is being done to help passengers during the cost of living crisis and to support vulnerable bus routes.

Then from 1st November, 2023 until November, 2024 the maximum single fare cap is being raised to £2.50.

There will be a new £300 million Government investment to protect bus services into 2025 and keep travel affordable.

The funding boost will support the bus sector's long- term recovery, taking total investment for buses to more than £3.5 billion since March, 2020

Transport Secretary Mark Harper confirmed "£300 million to protect vital routes and improve services until 2025 that people rely on for work, education, medical appointments and shopping".

"To help people with cost of living pressures and save on emergency travel costs, the Government will also provide up to £300 million to continue capping single bus fares at £2.00 outside London until the end of October, 2023 and then at £2.50 until 30th November, 2024 – when the Government will review their effectiveness and future bus fares".

The office for budget responsibility (OBR) estimates that inflation will be halved by the end of the year, and capping fares at £2.50 until November, 2024 will create longer term certainty for bus users over the next year.

The move is an essential part of the Government's "Help for Households" initiative to support everyone through the increased cost of living, and will particularly benefit those on lower incomes who take 3 times as many bus trips than those on higher incomes.

During the pandemic, bus usage dropped as low as 10% of prepandemic levels and while passenger levels have recovered to around 85% to 90%, the fare cap aims to encourage people back on the bus, which can help reduce congestion and emissions.

So what does this mean locally

For £4.00 return you can travel to Norwich and back from Belton. However if you were going to Southwold for the day you are better buying a £7.00 daily Coastal Zone ticket as you will have to change at James Paget Hospital and at Lowestoft.

But! - £2.00 each way Belton to Norwich – make the most of it while it lasts.

ENTUA's discussions with Norfolk County Council

We are still very disappointed that Norfolk County Council has not made any firm commitment to use some of its BSIP (Bus Service Improvement Programme) money on improving bus services in the Great Yarmouth area. Several BSIP funded schemes have been put in place in Norwich, North Norfolk, North East Norfolk and West Norfolk, but nothing in East Norfolk.

ENTUA's main points are:-

- **1.** A six days per week hourly service from Market Gates to Harfreys Estate and Gapton Hall Retail Park.
- 2. A year round service linking the town's Rail Station with bus services at Market Gates
- **3.** An extension of Bradwell's Service 6 to Belton hourly (to link with Millwood/Falklands GP Practices and Plummers dental surgery) and to link Bradwell to James Paget Hospital via A47/A143 link road hourly with alternating Service 6.

ENTUA have had discussions with our Member of Parliament, Brandon Lewis raising our concerns that the Great Yarmouth area is not getting a `fair crack of the whip` with BSIP.



Here are a few more shrubs that you may wish to consider either in large containers or in the garden.

Buddleia 'Magenta Munchkin' Common name Butterfly Bush has fuchsia red flowers 7-8" and has lighter centres' on each individual flower. Very floriferous and exceedingly good for encouraging butterlies. It is early to

flower, is compact and short in stature. Requires

moist, well-drained soil or compost and likes full sun or partial shade.

Convolvulus cheorum

Convolvulus cneorum is a native of Mediterranean limestone hills. Its evergreen foliage is covered in silky silver-grey hairs, and the flowers start as pink buds which open into 2.5cm trumpets, with blush white

petals marked with a central pink stripe. The Royal Horticultural Society has given it its prestigious Award of Garden Merit (AGM). Grow Convolvulus cneorum in well-drained soil in full sun, ideally in a

rockery or similar situation. Prune hard annually to maintain bushy growth down to the ground.

Rose Zepeti This miniature rose has lush, dark green glossy foliage and dazzling, bright red semi-double flowers that are produced in clusters. The fragrant flowers are small

at 5 cm (2 in) across but are intensely coloured, and 'Zepeti' is very free flowering, producing abundant blooms continuously from May until October. Zepeti' is exceptionally resistant to fungal diseases such as powdery mildew and black spot and is also extremely tolerant of both summer heat and winter frosts. This makes it an incredibly robust rose that will always perform well. As a miniature rose, it is very well suited to growing in a pot, where it makes a stunning focal point, particularly because its leaves and flowers always look so immaculate. Planted in the garden, it also looks good growing amongst small shrubs and perennials.

There will be photos of the local area and further afield taken over the last 10-15 years or so. Come and see how the area has changed.



A Short History of the James Paget site

The James Paget University Hospital is located on a site where there is evidence of prehistoric and Roman activity.

Aerial photography held by the Norfolk Museums Service has shown the likely remains of a Bronze Age barrow by the hospital site. Barrows can be identified as round mounds, often surrounded by a 'ring ditch' from which the earth and stone for the mound was dug. They were primarily burial places but were also used for carrying out the many other community rituals.

More recently, the site was heavily defended in World War Two, with a searchlight battery located just to the west of the hospital and a heavy anti-aircraft battery to the east. These features can be seen in the photograph below, taken in 1945, which is reproduced courtesy of Norfolk County Council.



In June 1953, a United States Airforce jet fighter - a North American Sabre - based at RAF Bentwaters, near Woodbridge - caught fire and crashed on what is now the hospital car park.

By the early 1970s there was a real need for a new hospital but the difficulty was where it should be built.

Situated between the two main population centres of Great Yarmouth and Lowestoft, Gorleston appeared to be the natural choice and what was agricultural land at the time was compulsory purchased for the building.

The new Health District of Yarmouth and Waveney and its District General Hospital did not happen by pure chance – an enormous amount of background preliminary planning and organising had first taken place; in reality, this story of how the James Paget came to be goes back well over 50 years.

A team of planners from the Ministry of Health in London arrived in Norwich during 1973 to support the re-organisation of the Health District locally. Their task was abolishing the existing Norfolk Health Authority and setting up several shadow District Health authorities. This forms part of the background that led to plans for the new Great Yarmouth and Waveney District General Hospital.

In the newly-formed Health District of Yarmouth and Waveney, there were eleven hospitals, two short-term care centres, and many 'Leagues of Friends' and volunteer-led services. Financial support for the creation of the new hospital came from these areas, plus other community groups and organisations that raised huge sums of money between them.

There was definitely a need for a new District General Hospital; both Great Yarmouth and Lowestoft had wonderful - but very old – hospitals that were not built for modern healthcare and treatments, reflecting the advances in technology seen back then."





Ministry of Health policy said that each Health District should have one large central hospital to meet general acute treatment needs, and had developed plans for six identically designed and built hospitals for the East of England region – with the James Paget being the last built. In July 1977, RJ Carter was granted a contract to undertake the first phase of construction work.

In 1982, with the new hospital steadily opening up to offer care and treatment to patients, big events were planned by the new hospital administration team to show off the new hospital to the public. I really value the memories of showing the community around what would become the James Paget Hospital, and our roles in helping the hospital to get built."



Sir James Paget, 1814 – 1899, was an outstanding medical man of the 19th century, known best for his reports and studies of the progressive bone disorder known as Paget's Disease of the bone, or Osteitis Deformans.

James Paget was born on 11 January 1814 in a mansion on South Ouay, Great Yarmouth, and was educated at Reverend Bowles private school in Queens Street. His success was based on his great knowledge of pathology and physiology and he is regarded as the father of British pathology.

He stressed the importance of bringing science into medical practice. In the mid 1800s he supported the ideal of women becoming doctors and was very willing to try new medical treatment methods. He was a very popular teacher, a great orator, fine writer and was passionate about good patient care.

Besides describing Paget's disease of bone and Paget's disease of the nipple, for which he is well known, James Paget was the first to describe eight other conditions, one of which was compression of the median nerve known today as 'carpal tunnel syndrome'. He was also the first surgeon to experiment with using water beds to help patients with bedsores.

He was President of the Royal College of Surgeons of England, a Fellow of the Royal Society and Surgeon to Queen Victoria for 41 years.

Sir James officially opened the old Great Yarmouth General Hospital in 1886. Selecting James Paget as the name for the new hospital took over five years and involved a great deal of heated debate.
