#### **Rodent Racism**

Readers may not know that Grey squirrels (squirus carolinensis) are an oppressed minority worldwide, confined to easgtern North America and the UK. The great majority of squirrels are the common squirrels (squris vulgaris), usually Red or Black who range across the world.

Seemingly however, the world is not enough and crown Agencies are taking vigorous steps to suppress UK Grey squirrels, in favour of Reds. Measures which some may deem unacceptably cruel.

It is true that squirrels cause significant damage to trees and predate on bird's eggs, but this can never justify the cruel "control measures" inflicted on Greys.

Control measures include ground trapping of adult squrrels leaving squirrel Kits ( who need mother for ten weeks) to die in the Drey.

Also trapped squirrels are "humanely" killed either by being shot with a 0.22 calibre air pistol or tipped into a close woven black fabric bag where it can be held with the head in one corner and killed by "cranial dispatch" using a cosh.

#### **NOVEMBER ROADWORKS**



## Belton with Browston Parish Council



councillor Stuart Bridges who was a councillor till this Mays elections and Michael Cox who were both co-opted on to the Council, bringing it up to 10 of its allocation of 13 members, David Mills chaired the meeting.

The Clerk reported on prices and options for cleaning all of the villages bus shelters and it was agreed that one clean should be undertaken by Snell and Brown Cleaning Contractors. The final decision was taken on the installation of a new boiler at the New Road Centre, after all members had been asked to give their opinions on the two quotes on the table it was agreed that the work should be undertaken by G. Y. Heating. Also, at New Road its members considered two options to repair the fence in the south east corner but agreed to consider a further option of installing a gate in that corner for use for large events but agreed to speak to the residents down the adjacent lane next.

There were no new planning applications, only approvals from the Borough Council for about seven lots of broadband electronic communications apparatus and a two-storey domestic extension at Decoy House, Browston lane, Browston. A new Tree Protection Order has also been approved on land to the south east of Mill Road, Burgh Castle that lies within the Belton boundary.

The only member of the public present asked why the edges of Bell Lane from the shops to the church were not now being cut by GY Services, he had contacted them without a reply, the clerk was asked to chase this up, the same person complimented the Council and caretaker on how well the New Road car boot sales had been organised during the Summer. The chairman reported that he has reported uncut sections of hedge on New Road to County Councillor Annison as this is a route to school for some pupils.

Councillor Greenacre updated members on the progress of the Neighbourhood Plan and said the Steering Group are hopefully looking to submit the draft to GYBC soon and then hold a public consultation.

The next meeting of the Parish Council takes place at the New Road Sport and Leisure Centre on Tuesday November 7th (Please note that from this meeting forward all Council meetings will commence at 7pm rather than 7.30), full details from the Parish Clerk, Kate Ruddock on 01493 602960 or e-mail beltonparish@vahoo.co.uk. There are still three vacancies on the

Council that can be filled by co-option, full information from the Clerk on the contact details above.

## Burgh Castle Parish Council



S ix members of the Parish Council plus two members of the public and the Parish Clerk attended the October 9th Meeting of the Parish Council at the Village Hall, Brian Swan was in the chair.

A resident of Back Lane was present to raise safety concerns over the lane, he was concerned that verges were not getting cut (he and a neighbour had cut theirs) and the speed of vehicles, he said the offer of horse riding warning notices at each end of the road through the County Council was insufficient, the council has since passed his concerns on to Borrough Councillor Graham Carpenter who had met with him earlier.

Members accepted a quote from DR Gardening Services to remodel the two shrub beds at the burial ground as the existing plants have gradually increased in size too much for the location, members agreed to again write to the Archaeological Trust over the Roman Fort site entrance flooding and ask what other maintenance is planned for the site, it was noted that grass cutting had commenced but concerns were noted over the growth on some of the hedges, especially those fronting Church Road and on The Loke from the church triangle.

Members noted that they are still waiting to hear from the County Council to provide the work dates for the resurfacing of Crows Farm corner on High Road and for placing posts to prevent verge parking outside the Roman Fort. It was agreed to advertise

Members are still trying to get the normal service 5 buses reinstated with return trips to Yarmouth and Gorleston during term time afternoons, the take up from Lynn Grove High School pupils on the altered trips that now run into Belton and terminate there has been minimal compared to the number of Belton pupils that residents had indicated would be using the service from September when they attended a parish council meeting prior to the Summer, County Councillor Penny Carpenter who has responsibility for school services will be contacted.

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September meeting of Fritton with St. Olaves Parish Councillors attended the 21st September meeting of Fritton with St. Olaves Parish Council held at Fritton Village Hall along with County Councillor Carl Annison and the Parish Clerk, also present was John Wadeson who was co-opted on to the Council to bring it up to its full strength of 10 members, Stannas Bellaby chaired the meeting.

English Heritage have been contacted to see who now holds the keys to St Olaves Priory as the previous holder had passed away earlier. The Borough Council have confirmed that the mechanical road sweeper only visits once a year but there are currently staffing issues with the use of this machine and Councillor Richards confirmed that the Decoy Public House has been included as a nondesignated heritage site in the Neighbourhood plan that is in the process of preparation.

There were many Highways matters discussed during the meeting, some of these being concerns from County Highways about a tree on Beccles Road that has Ash die back, the chairman will check to see if this is on Parish Council land, if so, quotes will be required to deal with it. Councillor Richards had received a request for a 'trod' path on part of Herringfleet Road, the County Council will be asked if this is a possibility. Councillor Storey raised concerns about the SAM2 machine on New Road at Fritton not working, this was a flat battery issue, now resolved and the unit has been moved to its next location. The condition of the path from Fritton church to the A143 was discussed but as it is thought to be on Somerleyton Estate land the Estates Manager will be contacted.

County Councillor Annison reported that the main A143 at St. Olaves will be closed overnight (8pm – 6am) between November 13th and 17th for resurfacing at the Herringfleet Road junction in St. Olaves The County Council will be extending the double white lines near the Cherry Lane Garden Centre and it was agreed to ask them to also repaint the wite lines at Fritton Lake entrance that have faded badly. Councillor Storey reported that Cherry Lane had offered a contribution to NCC towards safety work outside their property but that this had been refused by the County Council. County Councillor Annison will chase the County who promised to cut hedges on New Road after the bird nesting period to get this work done and Councillor Story asked about signs that went up on the same road last year indicating surface works that were however never undertaken.

The Borough Council have refused outline permission for one new self-build dwelling at Forestry Cottage, New Road, Fritton while a new Tree Preservation Order has been agreed for specimens at Waveney Forest House on the same road.

## THE FOUR WINDS by Kristin Hannah (pub. 2021- Pan Books)

This story is set in the central Great Plains of North America at the time of the 1930's depression and the era of the Dust Bowl occurrences on the plains of Oklahoma and Texas.

The main character, Elsa (Martinelli) was originally from a strict religious family and unloved. As she grew older, she looked for love, found it with Rafe and became pregnant.

Rafe Martinelli was the son of an Italian immigrant farming family, who was obliged to marry Elsa. Elsa worked hard on the farm, learned how to cook and eventually earned the love and respect of his parents, Rose and Toni. The baby, Loreda, was born and in time, her young son, Ant.

The dry weathers and extreme drought began when Loreda was 10 years old and Ant was 6. All the farmers in the region were optimistic and saying that the rains would come. Unfortunately, they did not. The drought got worse and the animals and people suffered. Added to the lack of rain for growing crops was the increase of horrendous dust storms accompanied by wild and destructive winds. They were so bad that the young children had to wear gas masks to prevent the dust from blocking their airways, even when indoors.

After one these storms, Rafe left the farm to travel west to California. There was no further news of him or from him. Elsa struggled on trying to help Rose and Tim to keep going, until during one bad storm, Ant was taken ill with a fever and struggled to breathe. He recovered in the local hospital. This was the last straw for Elsa, and with the blessing of Rose and Tim, she set out for California with Loreda and Ant.

Rose and .... she set out for California with Loreda and Ant. The rest of the story tells of her arrival in California, where

nobody wants to know the refugees from the Dust Bowl. It describes the life in the camps outside the town and the lack of jobs at that time. The choice was seasonal cotton picking or moving to pick fruit. As the labour force increased, the landowners decreased the wages. Life was hard for all the family but they persevered, helped each other and developed close bonds.

I enjoyed reading this book. It drew me into the emotions and hardships of everyday living in the 1930's. The social history of the times was so interesting and gave an excellent insight into the smaller details of living during that era and in those conditions. It was a book I had difficulty in putting down.



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## NAVIGATING THE CHALLENGES OF ADOLESCENT DOGS: A GUIDE FOR PET OWNERS

Adolescence is a challenging time for humans, and it's no different for dogs. If you've ever raised a puppy, you know that the early stages are filled with cute moments, cuddles, and lots of training. However, as your puppy grows, they enter their teenage years, and just like human teenagers, they start to be challenging, exhibit new behaviours, and push your patience to the limit. Adolescent dogs are more likely to end up in rescue than any other age bracket. In this blog post, we'll explore the challenges that adolescent dogs can present and provide some tips on how to deal with them.

#### The Adolescent Stage in Dogs: What to Expect

The adolescent stage for dogs typically begins around 6 to 18 months of age, depending on the breed and size of the dog. Each puppies development stage can vary dog to dog. The adolescent phase can be characterised by several challenges, each owner might experience some or all of them.

#### **Rebellious behaviour**

It can feel like your adolescent dog is challenging your authority and the boundaries you have been setting. You will find they listen to you less and it will feel like they are less responsive to what they are asked to do. However, this is less to do with them 'disobeying you' and more to do with the changes they are going through. As well as the hormonal challenges they face, their brain is also undergoing changes. If you have a hound or gundog, they will also be developing their 'nose'. If all these elements collide, it is like taking a bottle of fizz and shaking it then waiting for the bubbles to pop out.

#### Brain Changes

Much the same as humans, the brain matures from the back to the front. This means part of the brain (the frontal lobe) has not finished developing. It is this part of the brain which has the capacity for self-control, which results in a lack of impulse control. Basically, the parts of the brain responsible for dampening emotions are not fully formed, this happens at the end of adolescence. Communication between two key parts of the brain grand gr

#### Hormonal Changes

For intact male and female dogs, this is when hormonal changes can lead to increased marking, roaming, and in the case of females, their first season. Hormones can reduce appetite (especially in male dogs) and in some instance an increase in aggression (less likely to do with hormones but something else). Increased Energy

Many adolescent dogs experience a surge in energy levels, making them more rambunctious and prone to destructive behaviour if not properly exercised. Exercise is not just in physical form but mental exercise through training and enrichment to ensure the extra energy is channelled well.

#### **Emotional Struggle**

Adolescence can be a vulnerable time for your dog's emotional development, leading to an increased likelihood of separation anxiety. Though signs would probably have been present prior to adolescence, it will be more obvious once in this stage. They can also become more selective with their interactions with other people and dogs. Once friendly they can become fearful or reactive in unfamiliar situations or start challenging dogs of the same sex. This is also a time where issues might be experienced in a multi-dog household.

#### Dealing with Adolescent Dog Challenges

Adolescent dogs can be a handful, but with the right approach and plenty of patience, you can help your friend navigate this challenging phase. Consistent training, exercise, and socialisation are essential components of raising a well-adjusted adult dog. Remember that it's just a phase, and your commitment to their well-being will pay off in the long run. Your dog will eventually mature into a well-behaved, happy, and loving companion, and you'll have the satisfaction of knowing you played a significant role in their development. So, stay strong and keep guiding your adolescent dog with love and understanding as they grow into the wonderful adult they are meant to be.

'Paw'fect Work - Lily has splashed out (her own money of course) on some personalised stickers. Class teachers will be sending children to show Lily their best work in exchange for a sticker and a photograph of their work featuring in the blog post for that day.

Since the beginning of the new term, Lily the three-year-old Cockapoo has begun visits to Moorlands for short periods of time to get used to the children, staff and surroundings and has settled in well to her new role.

Rvan Freeman, Executive Headteacher of The Ark Federation said: "Lily is an important member of our school team. The staff love having Lily in school, we get people coming down throughout the day to see her or offer to take her for a walk. She is definitely a good aide for well-being."

Mr Freeman added: "We have a high number of vulnerable children and Lily has proved to be a fantastic way to break down barriers. She has helped school refusers to get into the building, withdrawn children to smile and talk, and helps to calm children at times when they have become disregulated. She is also very popular with some of our parents, who come to see her on the school gate in the mornings.

We have wanted to introduce Lily into Moorlands for a while, but we have taken it slowly to make sure that she is ready. Lily is our


#### family pet and was bought with the fact that she may become a school dog in mind. We looked carefully at breeders and temperaments, making sure that she had the best chance possible of being calm and loving with children and adults. Being allergic to most breeds of dog myself, we were also conscious of the 'hypoallergenic' gualities that cockapoos have. Lily has been attending training classes since she was a few months old and still goes weekly to ensure that she is calm and responsive to commands. Once she had completed her first bronze award, she began making short visits to school to get

used to the people and environment. This was built up over a few months and then gradually we have introduced her to more elements of the school day."

He alsdo added: "It is wonderful to have Lily working across both of our federated schools. We are working on joint initiatives more and more, and this is the latest benefit of being federated. Lily loves being in both schools and is totally at home. She can often be found curled up asleep under a desk or visiting office staff for a little affection. During the day, Lily meets children as part of the school's pastoral provision. They take her for walks, complete training activities, or simply come for a

cuddle. Lily does not visit classrooms, as we are very careful that children with allergies are able to move around the school without any limits being imposed on them, but she is a prominent member of the Federation family all the same."

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MALCOLM METCALS IN HIS MON YEAR WELL ATTEMPT IN UMFOUS CHALLENCES RASING FUNDS FOR THE STAT PRESCILLA BACCO

> As many of you will know Malcolm Metcalf is a good friend of the Village Voice, with his extensive knowledge of nature he wrote over 100 monthly articles for the magazine up to June 2021. Malcolm has now written the following for the Village Voice.

was born in Gorleston in 1933 and have lived there all my life except for evacuation as a school boy to Abingdon for part of WW2 and indeed have been in the same house since 1949. At the age of 19 I was hospitalised for a year laying flat on my back for much of the time with T.B. and vowed that if I recovered, I would travel the world. Over 50 years ago I started my first adventure hitchhiking to Australia and worked there to earn my passage home, since that I have visited 58 countries, including the USA 23 times where I have visited 43 states.

Earlier this year, as I saw my 90th birthday coming up on December 4th, I decided to take on 90 challenges, one for every year of my life and have recently achieved this target, indeed when I went to Norwich City FC on October 24th for the Match against Middlesborough that was my 100th challenge. At the match it was announced that I am their Community Hero of the season and as part of the afternoons events I placed the match ball on the centre spot for kick-off



All of my fundraising this year has been for the new building at the Pricilla Bacon Lodge in Norwich and I have thoroughly enjoyed my seven months of challenges throughout Norfolk and beyond and made many new friends in the process.

Over the last few months some of the highlights have been Visiting Sizewell Power Station, Feeding Noah the Giant Turtle at Great Yarmouth Sea Life Centre, ringing bells at Great Ryburgh Church, riding a Harley Davidson motorcycle, shearing a sheep, having my own 2 hour show on BBC Radio Norfolk, a two-hour interview on Harbour Radio, Visiting Gleneagles Golf Course in Scotland and flying in a 4-seater Piper aircraft when the pilot allowed me to take the controls.

I achieved my 90th challenge on Saturday September 30th when I put together a list of 15 challenges, large and small on the same day starting at my Gorleston home and ending at Saddlebow Road Speedway stadium in Kings Lynn, *this is the list*.

1. Riding in a police car from my home to Great Yarmouth Bus Station

- 2. A Mustang car from Yarmouth to Acle.
- **3.** In a chimney Sweeps new van from Acle to the Maids Head Hotel in Norwich.

- 4. A Bentley car from there to the Priscilla Bacon Hospice in Norwich.
- **5.** Riding in a big blue articulated cab unit from the Hospice to Silfield near Wymondham.
- 6. A 1934 Wolsey car to Dereham.
- 7. The famous Elvis Presly Cadillac car to Swaffham.
- 8. Lunch at Swaffham.
- 9. Honda motorbike to Narborough.
- 10. Ride on a 3 wheeler motor trike.
- 11. Riding a tractor.



## **CHANGES TO LANDLINE TELEPHONES**

The UK's telephone network is being upgraded, which means that landline services are changing. You can still have a landline in your home, but the technology that powers it will be different. For most, switching over will be straightforward, but some people may need new equipment or support to make the changes.

#### What's changing and when?

Traditionally, landlines have been delivered through an analogue network, but this is being replaced by digital technology. The new system is called 'Voice over Internet Protocol' (VoIP), but you may also hear the terms 'Digital Voice' (from the landline provider BT) or digital phone.

Once you've moved to the new digital system, your landline will mainly work as it always has, although there'll be some differences – for example, it won't work if there's a power cut unless you have a battery backup.

The changeover has started, and some people have already been moved to the digital system.

For almost all networks, the changeover will have happened by December 2025.

The BT network, which is used by some other telecoms providers, will close by December 2025. Most other companies with their own networks, like Virgin Media, plan to follow the same timescale.

BT has now started to contact a limited number of customers, having paused its changeover programme, and will begin to roll out the programme on a region-by-region basis from summer 2023. However, they aren't currently switching certain groups, including:

people aged 70 and over

people with additional needs

people who only have a landline (and not broadband)

- people with telecare alarms
- people with no mobile signal at home.

Other companies have also started rolling out digital systems. In some areas, changes to the network will mean that everyone needs to move to the digital system. You may also be moved to the new system if you decide to move to a new phone and broadband package.

If you haven't been moved over yet, don't worry – your phone company will get in touch with you when they want you to make the change.

Throughout this page, we'll be talking about broadband and broadband companies or services. When we say 'broadband', we just mean a high-speed internet connection.

#### Why are these changes happening?

The current landline network needs to be replaced because it's old and is becoming difficult to maintain. The new system uses the internet to make phone calls – this offers better quality calls as well as some additional features. Phone and broadband companies are leading this change. The Government is supporting it. The aim of Ofcom (the communications regulator) is to make sure customers don't face unnecessary disruption or harm because of the changes.

#### What happens when I change to the digital system?

Your telephone provider will contact you in advance to let you know when your system's changing and what you need to do. In some cases, an engineer will need to visit to make changes. For lots of people, the change will be straightforward. If you already have a broadband connection, you may just need to plug your phone into your broadband router or you'll be sent an adapter that connects to your phone and plugs into your router. If you have more than one phone socket with separate handsets, you may need additional adapters.

When you're contacted by your provider let them know if you have any questions or concerns about moving to the digital service, or if you need any additional help.

#### Can I keep my phone number?

Yes - in most cases you'll be able to keep your current phone number.

#### Will I need a new phone?

If your phone handset is very old, you might need to change it. Your phone provider will be able to advise you on this.

## Will anything else be affected, like my telecare?

The switch to digital landlines may affect telecare devices and other equipment such as personal alarms and security alarms if they're connected to your phone line.

Although your telephone service provider will contact you before the switch takes place, you may want to let them know about any telecare devices that you have in advance. It's also a good idea to contact the supplier of your telecare device to check that this will work with the new system or whether any equipment will need to be upgraded.

If you're buying a new device that's linked to the phone system, you should also check with the seller or manufacturer that this will be compatible.

#### What if I don't have, or don't want, the internet at home?

If you already have a broadband connection, for example to connect to the internet, then the new digital landline system will use this.

If you don't have a broadband connection, your provider will supply one specifically to support the new digital system, but you shouldn't pay extra for this if you don't move over to a broadband service.

#### Will I have to pay more?

BT has committed to not raise prices above inflation for 'voice only' customers until 2026. 'Voice only' customers are those who don't have home broadband. Virgin Media has also said that people won't pay more than what they already pay for their current service.

This means that you shouldn't face extra costs if you need a new simple internet connection to make calls.

#### What happens if there's a power cut?

Unlike some traditional corded analogue phones, a digital phone will only work in a power cut if it has a battery back-up, because it'll run using your home electricity. In these instances, phone companies are advising people to use mobile phones as a backup.

If you're dependent on your landline phone – for example, if you don't have a mobile phone or you live somewhere where there's no or poor mobile signal, then your telephone provider must offer you a 'resilience solution' to make sure you can make emergency calls during a power cut. This could be a mobile phone (if you have mobile signal) or a battery-backup unit for your landline phone.

This resilience solution should be provided free of charge to people who are dependent on their landline. If you're not eligible for a free resilience solution, you may be able to purchase one from your provider or another retailer – talk to your provider about the options available to you.

#### Is there anything I should watch out for?

As the switchover is affecting millions of homes, this can create an opportunity for criminals to develop new scams. These scam attempts could happen over the phone, via email, or in person on your doorstep.

Remember the following scam advice when someone's contacting you about the switchover:

**STOP** – take a moment to stop and think before parting with your money or your personal information.

**CHALLENGE** – could it be fake? It's OK to reject, refuse or ignore any requests. You should never feel rushed or pressured into making a decision.

**PROTECT** – contact your bank immediately if you think you've been a victim of a scam and report it to Action Fraud by calling 0300 123 2040.

Other unscrupulous people may also try to sell you equipment or get you to sign up to expensive contracts that you don't need. In these cases, it's important that you don't rush into making any decisions. You can always seek a second opinion and speak to your phone company – they should be able to advise you about what you need.

## COME TO THE **DARK SIDE! DARK SKIES IN** OUR PARISH

The Green & Environment Group of Ashby Herringfleet and Somerleyton Parish Council are investigating establishing a Dark Skies Village status.

We know from consultations on the Neighbourhood Plan and recent planning applications that people in our community value and wish to preserve dark skies.

As well as giving people a clearer view of the dark skies above, reducing light pollution can also benefit wildlife and improve your health.

Starry skies are one of the most magical sights the countryside can offer. Light pollution not only limits our views of these skies but disrupts wildlife's natural pattern.

Questionnaires will soon be delivered to residents in Ashby Herringfleet and Somerleyton asking for their views on this plan whether they would support Dark Skies status for our villages, have guidance in reducing stray lighting such as restricting all external lights to motion sensitive lights.

#### What do you do to help you remember what you mustn't forget? Does it work?

There are some dates that might be etched in your memory, such as your own birthday, your children's birthdays, the day someone you loved died, a wedding day/anniversary, or Christmas Day. But what about Remembrance Day? The eleventh hour, of the eleventh day of the eleventh month – it has been made as easy as it is possible to remember, and with the poppies on sale nearly everywhere we go, it isn't easy for that date to pass us by.

Looking back, it was five years ago that we remembered the 100 year anniversary of the end of the First World War with a giant "Tommy" created with hand-made crocheted and knitted poppies, hanging from the church tower of All Saints, Belton. We have long passed that time when the last veteran of that war died, and in a few years there will not be any veterans from World War 2 alive. Last year it was the 40th anniversary of the Falklands war; it is 88 years since the end of World War 2. When I look at the news on the TV or hear it on the radio, I wonder what our world has learnt in the time since our world wars. Have we learnt anything? In recent years we have seen many nations begin conflicts with neighbouring

countries, or even invade them. Currently we are seeing nations taking one side or another in the conflict between Israel and Palestine, with the danger of escalation of this conflict. Israel and Palestine have been involved in wars a number of times in the last century, and generally the people do not want it.

Remembering the cost of war to our nation is important; the loss of lives of so many military personnel, the devastation of bombing that occurred in this area with the loss of life that came with it, significant, too. In remembering those who lost their lives in the first and second world wars and the conflicts our nation has been involved in since then, has to go some way to keeping war off the agenda for us. Teaching our children about it in a way that doesn't seek to glorify war, but tells the story honestly, is vital.

Having the Belton Scouts attend the Remembrance Service at Belton again this year is part of this, and so important. I still remember going to Remembrance services with my Dad, when I was quite young. Dad had been in the RAF and served in Africa towards the end of the war. He and my Mum both did a lot of work with the Royal British Legion, especially in the care of exservicemen and women in their local area, and my Dad carried the Royal British Legion Standard at numerous parades around the county.

I will be leading Remembrance services during the week at Burgh House, and for Moorlands Academy on Friday 10th November in church, as well as the usual All Saints Belton service at 10.30am and the Burgh Castle Remembrance Service at 4pm on Sunday 12th November. Some of us will have members of our family who served this country during the wars and recent conflicts; it is so important to remember with thanksgiving every one of them, and especially those who lost their lives as a consequence. Do come along and join us for one of the Remembrance services, you will be made very welcome.

would like to explore in the NHS. If after the interview you would like to take part in the scheme a full one days training is given, this training is the same that is given to all NHS workers. If you are worried about your English or Maths academic levels, there is support for this on the scheme as well, so please do not think that this would be a bar to you participating.

This is truly an exciting opportunity for people to work in our NHS which has been caring for people since 1948 and of which literally millions of people are grateful for. Imagine, just for a minute, being able to try out a particular job with great support just to see if you would like it and which could lead to a worthwhile and fantastic career. I started as a volunteer in a local authority and ended up with a 14 year career supporting young adults in residential settings and qualifying as a social worker.

The scheme will be starting in January of 2024 and contact details for applying are

below. Here is a testimony from Dom who took part in the scheme.

"I wanted to volunteer to give something back, having grown up in and around a caring environment. I also wanted experience in a healthcare setting. A word from your Local MP **BRANDON LEWIS** MP writes



At the time of writing this column, we are reaching the end of the Conference season for the major political parties. Although these large-scale affairs can seem remote, they are essential parts of the political process, and I thought it would be helpful to offer readers an insight into these gatherings, and my own experience this year, at the Conservative Party Conference.

For ten years, I attended as a government minister. That can be particularly difficult because you are walking the tightrope of answering tough questions from conference representatives without slipping up. Saying something that will excite the pack of journalists that prowl every corridor and bar in the conference complex will see you guickly in the newspapers and on political blogs. Then you are pursued everywhere by a range of lobbyists representing businesses, charities, professional organisations, and many more interest groups all desperate for you to hear how you should change government policy.

So, it was a welcome change to spend time at the conference this year as a backbench Member of Parliament. Gone were the constraints of ministerial collective responsibility. I could pop into a fringe event, to listen to a debate or a speaker, without any speculation about why I was there. In many ways, the hundreds of smaller fringe events are more important than the set-piece speeches in the main conference hall. It is here that you can listen to the new ideas presented by other MPs, think tanks, and other organisations. These ideas can be robustly challenged and debated. It's an incubator for future policies that may find their way into a General Election manifesto, become government policy, and eventually law.

Unlike other political parties, as Conservatives we enjoy genuine debate and members can dissent from the normal party line. That's why senior politicians could openly question the current tax burden, putting forward a strong case for reducing taxes to help our economy grow. It's an argument I resolutely support, as not only would they drive growth lower taxes would help families across the Borough with the cost of living, especially those in rural communities who need to use a car to get around and are living with still very high fuel prices.

#### ELECTRIC BUSES FOR NORWICH

The first batch of 6 battery powered buses have been delivered to Norwich. Two of the fleet have been used on driver training and are now believed to be in service, four others are stored. In total 49 Street Deck Electro liner manufactured by Wrights will see service on Norwich City's major routes.

#### ENTUA'S SUBMISSION FOR IMPROVED BUS SERVICES

We are becoming increasingly frustrated at the reluctance of Norfolk County Council officers to agree to our requests for

- a) A regular hourly bus service from Market Gates to Gapton Retail Park,
- b) Extension of Bradwell Service 6 to Belton (hourly) and
- c) An all year round bus connection to the railway station.

Norfolk County Council say they are allocating £5 million of their share of Government allocation for improved bus services in the Great Yarmouth area. However they are not convinced that an hourly bus service to Gapton Hall Retail Park would be financially viable after the County's bus subsidy ceased in April, 2025. They argue that passengers would become dissatisfied with the service due to late running buses and stop using them. ENTUA argues that given an hourly frequency at Gapton Hall Retail Park would only lose 15 minutes at worst when traffic is congested and this would only be at certain times of the day, but even then the bus would still have time to get back to Market Gates in time for the next hourly departure. We also argue that Great Yarmouth is the only large conurbation in Norfolk where the non-driving population do not have public transport access to their main shopping centres.

Likewise with extending Service 6 to Belton so Belton residents can access doctors and dentists in Bradwell, Norfolk County Council are not convinced that enough passengers would use the service once the subsidy expires in April, 2025, for the service to be cost-effective. However we are still persevering with our requests for these proposed services to be given more consideration.

To be fair to Norfolk County Council they are undertaking a feasibility study with a view to creating a bus hub on North Quay close to the bridge access to the railway station and are proposing to create lay-bys on either side of the A47 at the entrance to the railway station where passengers can alight from or board the X1/X11 bus serving between Gt. Yarmouth and Norwich. Great Yarmouth Borough Council has some funding available towards these schemes.

#### PASSENGER FOCUS SURVEY.

Passenger Focus has undertaken a survey of 14,000 bus passengers and the main points are as follows:-

- 1. Satisfaction with the bus driver consistently scores the highest with 85% satisfied overall. We know from our past research that the bus driver can make all the difference between a good and great journey.
- 2. 67% of passengers say they are satisfied with the value for money of their fares - and nearly 4 in 10 very satisfied. This is against the backdrop of cost of living issues and changes in service provision in some areas. The introduction of some fare initiatives in areas, such as the £2.00 capped single journey fare, appear to be making a positive difference to some passengers.
- 3. There are some mixed results with significant ranges between some of the 35 participating survey areas. These include the passenger wait time at the bus stop which at its highest was 84% and at its lowest 57% - nearly a 30 percentage point between areas.

This large scale, independent survey of bus passengers provides a new benchmark for local transport authorities and bus operators - and it is encouraging to see many passengers are satisfied with their journey. However, the variations across areas and operations seem so far to show that more needs to be done for passengers.

#### RAIL NEWS

Unfortunately the industrial action on the railway continues with strikes every month. It is always advisable to check Greater Anglia`s website for upto-date information.

However despite disruption on certain days, Greater Anglia`s performance over the past week was 96.3%, this is trains arriving at their destination within 5 minutes of their arrival time.
