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
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A word from the Editor Adrian Myers

Your Parish Council Reports

Belton with Browston Parish Council

The latest meeting of the Parish Council was held on November 7th with eight Parish Councillors present along with Kate Ruddock (Parish Clerk), Borough Councillor Graham Carpenter and two members of the public, David Mills chaired the meeting.

Several points were raised in the public section one was the possibility of closing off the entrance to The Tavern from Rosedale Gardens, the Chairman stated this is private land and has a covenant saying that it is only for owners use, however due to it being a walkway for many years closing it off may not now be possible. There is a blocked drain behind properties on Fern Gardens which GYBC, NCC and Anglian Water will not take responsibility for, can the Parish Council determine responsibility. There was a request to stop parking on verges, Councillor Greenacre stated there might be an opportunity for a bylaw to prevent this.

Members agreed to approve the New Road Field as an open space in the forthcoming Neighbourhood Plan and dates in December for the public consultation on the document that has been produced were noted (see centre pages of this Village Voice).

Councillor Cox had requested that the possibility of a roundabout at Belton Cross Roads be discussed again however Borough Councillor Carpenter stated that these cost in the region of £1m each and cannot be afforded by the County Council, however with action being needed it was agreed to ask Councillor Carpenter and County Councillor Carl Annison to push for a speed limit on this road all the way to Fritton.

In planning the following comments to the Borough Council were agreed – 67 Rosedale Gardens (Dropped kerb) no objections. 12 Ranworth Close (Retain single story side extension, replacement garage raised roof) no objections. 1 Beech Farm Barns, Beccles Road (Raise crown of Ash tree) no objections. Wedgewood, Sandy Lane, Belton (Reduce oak tree by 3.5 meters) no objections. Farewell Hales, Stepshort, Belton (use of existing rear building as 2 bed bungalow) objections- insufficient space for bungalow, no parking space and a shared driveway would result. 11 St James Crescent (Side extension to garage) no objections.

The applicant for 3 number four-bedroom properties on land south of Manor Farm, Browston Lane, Browston has given notice that he is appealing against the Borough Councils refusal. The Borough have approved Woodlands Rise, Browston Lane (removal of conservatory erection of single-story extension and wood burner chimney) but have refused at 55 Station Road South, Belton a request to remove roof and replace with one with a higher pitch to facilitate accommodation in the roof space. Sport England have again objected to car boot sales on the New Road Centre site, the Borough Council have suggested a new application with management plan for the sales and a map showing clearly that the sales will not go on to areas used as football pitches be submitted.

Members agreed to a resident creating a flower bed on Dashwood Close but with the condition that if he cannot maintain it in the future, he returns it to grass, permission from the Borough Council will be required. There will be a 'Citizen of the Year' award again this year, applications now being accepted (see separate item in this VV). With ample parking, disabled access and toilets and a bus service outside members agreed to suggest the New Road Centre as an alternative polling station to the Borough Council in response to the current boroughwide review of these facilities.

The next meeting of the Parish Council takes place at the New Road Sport and Leisure Centre on Tuesday December 5th at the new start time of 7.00pm details from the Parish Clerk, Kate Ruddock on 01493 602960 or e-mail beltonparish@yahoo.co.uk. There are still three vacancies on the Council that can be filled by co-option, full information from the Clerk on the contact details above. Please note that the January meeting will be one week later than normal on Tuesday January 9th to avoid the holiday period.

ix members of the Parish Council plus County Councillor Carl Smith, one member of the public and the Parish Clerk attended the November 13th Meeting of the Parish Council at the Village Hall, Brian Swan was in the chair.

Members were concerned about parking on the roadside now that posts are outside the Roman Fort and County Councillor Smith said he might be able to get yellow lines on that area, he will also try to get thicker, longer lasting posts around the village sign. It was confirmed that the long-awaited resurfacing of High Road by Crows Farm will take place on December 18th and 19th when there will also be some patching on Market Road. County Councillor Smith will also investigate a blocked drainage pipe from High Road towards the marshes which is believed to have been a contributary cause of the recent flooding and he will try to find responsibility for a drainage chamber on the corner of Mill Road, again a flooding problem area.

In planning members were against The Old Farmhouse at Hall Farm on Lords Lane being used as short term supported accommodation by Norfolk and Waveney Mind both on grounds of the rural and isolated location and this use of a listed building.

or M Grey 01493 781747 or email mgreenacre532@gmail.com There were no objections to upgrade to a radio base mast at Hollies Farm on High Road, cutting back a tree at Oaklands on Butt Lane that is subject to a tree Preservation order or small alterations to plans at Burwell Lodge on Market Road. The Broads Authority have approved a side extension at Crows Farm and similarly the Borough Council for amended workshop plans at 5 Holly Terrace on Church Road whilst the applicant for conversion of an agricultural building into two dwellings at Breydon View on Market Road has taken the refusal of permission by the Borough Council to appeal.

Members were very pleased with the alterations to the Burial Ground shrub beds by Darren Roches and repairs to the John Green memorial seat arranged by the family. At the Roman Fort site Norfolk Archaeological trust have indicated that they are looking for funding to resolve the entrance flooding and the Parish Council will advise the Trust of maintenance issues that concern them including hedges needing cutting including on Church Road and Butt Lane, the missing information boards in the shelter that have been left in the church for several years awaiting collection and the condition of the steps in the south west corner of the site leading down to the river.

The Chairman reported on ongoing issues with the Councils banking due to mistakes by Barclays Bank and it was agreed to take future banking to Lloyds Bank because of this.

Councillors were not satisfied with the reply from Norfolk County Council over the loss of afternoon buses in term time to part of the village to facilitate a service to Lynn Grove High School and the chairman will compose a further reply the council officer concerned.

The dates of the public consultation meetings of the draft of the three villages neighbourhood plan were noted (see centre pages) of this Village Voice) councillors and agreed to contribute to any overspend from the grants received for postage and advertising although the Clerk said this would be a very low figure when shared between the parish, Belton with Browston and Fritton and St. Olaves councils.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be on Monday December 11th commencing at 7.30pm at the Village Hall on Church Road, for details contact Kate Ruddock, the Parish Clerk, on 07948705218, e-mail burghcastleclerk@gmail.com.

A DOG'S SENSE OF SMELL: UNRAVELLING THE CANINE OLFACTORY MARVEL ROUGH

Dogs possess a superpower that leaves our human senses in the dust - an extraordinary sense of smell. If you've ever marvelled at your dog's ability to track a scent for miles, detect a hidden treat, or even sense your emotions, it's all thanks to their remarkable olfactory system. Let's dive into the science and wonder of a dog's sense of smell.

THE OLFACTORY ANATOMY

A dog's nose isn't just for sniffs; it's an intricate, high-tech instrument. Their olfactory system starts with the nostrils. Unlike humans, who breathe in and out through the same airway, dogs have a specialised fold of tissue in their nostrils that separates the two functions. This design allows dogs to inhale air through their nostrils for scent detection while expelling air through the slits in the side of their noses. This bifurcated airflow helps dogs maintain a constant scent stream and analyse smells more effectively. If you have ever seen your dog lift their nose up into the wind, take a breath in, then breath it back out, this is what they are doing.

The dog's nose is just the beginning. Inside the nose, there's a complex network of turbinate's, these are bony structures covered in specialised olfactory tissue. This tissue contains an astonishing number of olfactory receptors, also known as scent receptors. In fact, dogs have around 300 million scent receptors, while humans have a mere 5-6 million. This abundance of receptors allows them to detect odours at incredibly low concentrations, making their sense of smell tens of thousands of times more sensitive than ours.

SCENT PROCESSING IN THE BRAIN

Once a dog inhales a scent, the odorous molecules interact with their olfactory receptors, initiating a signal that travels to the olfactory bulb in the brain. This bulb serves as the initial processing centre for scent information. Unlike in humans, the dog's olfactory bulb is considerably larger in proportion to the brain, reflecting the importance of smell in their world.

From the olfactory bulb, the scent information is sent to other areas of the brain, including the limbic system and the amygdala. These regions are associated with emotions and memory. That's why your dog may react with joy when they catch a whiff of a familiar scent, such as their favourite treat, or favourite person!

The olfactory information also makes its way to the dog's primary olfactory cortex, where it's further analysed and processed. Dogs can distinguish between

various scents, identify the age and sex of the scent source, and even detect changes in scent concentration over time.

THE FACTS ABOUT A DOG'S SENSE OF SMELL

- ► Dogs can smell fear: it's not just a saying it's true! Dogs can sense when you're anxious or afraid, and they may react accordingly, either by becoming more protective or seeking to comfort you.
- Trained scent discrimination: working dogs, such as police dogs can be trained to discriminate between specific scent with remarkable precision. They can detect the smell of drugs or explosives, even when the odours are present.
- The wet nose effect: ever wonder why a dog's nose is often moist? The mucous on their nose helps capture scent particles and improves their olfactory ability.
- The Flehmen response: sometimes you may catch your dog curling back its lips and exposing its front teeth while sniffing something intensely. This is called the Flehmen response, and it helps draw more air over the scent-detecting organ in the roof of their mouth.


THE MARVEL OF A DOGS NOSE

It's a superpower that allows them to excel in roles such as search and rescue, medical assistance, and emotional support. Understanding the intricacies of a dog's olfactory system helps us appreciate the profound bond between humans and their canine companions.

So, the next time your dog sniffs around in the back garden or wags their tail when you return home, remember that they're not just exploring their environment, they're engaging in a sensory adventure that's beyond our imagination. Their noses are, indeed, an extraordinary gift that makes them the remarkable animals that we love so much.

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A word from your Local MP & Councillor





Last month we saw all the pomp and ceremony of a State Opening of Parliament, the first for the new King. It is likely to be the last before a General Election. The speech can be summarised in four short phrases or, as the political strategists would say, soundbites.

Grow the economy, keep people safe, strengthen so British interests.

All of those phrases are priorities, which are at the forefront of the conversations I have with residents across the Great Yarmouth constituency. In setting out the legislative agenda for the year ahead the Government has signalled that these are the priorities they will continue to pursue. This will bring benefits to people throughout Great Yarmouth.

First, the Government will grow the economy by introducing Bills that protect our energy security, secure the benefits of Brexit, and ensure we have the right framework for tech firms to compete and grow in the UK.

Second, a range of measures from protecting the health of young people and supporting private renters and landlords will strengthen our society.

Third, we will keep people safe by making sure the police have the powers they need, criminals get the punishment they deserve, and society is protected from terrorism. This includes the Sentencing Bill and the Criminal Justice Bill, giving the police more powers to keep us safe.

Fourth, we can promote Britain's national interests by backing our Armed Forces, supporting Ukraine and leading the way on the challenges of the future: climate change and Al.

I am particularly pleased to see the crime and justice measures

announced in the King's Speech, which will ensure the most serious criminals will receive the sentences they deserve. However, crime evolves as technology does, and the Government is giving police the tools they need to prevent new and complex crimes, such as digital-enabled crime, child sexual abuse, and child grooming.

I am surprised not to see a new Mental Health Bill for politicians to consider ahead of the General Election. This is an area that needs reform and has considerable support across the political divide. It is an issue that I know many constituents take an interest and I will watch carefully to see what action ministers take on this policy area.

There's an old political adage that when your opponents start attacking you personally, they've already lost the argument on policies. Whilst my local opponents spend their time designing amusing online attacks worthy of a sixth form common room, I'm getting on with the job of representing Great Yarmouth.

I am proud of my record as your Member of Parliament. The time commitment of my non-parliamentary roles is modest, and considerably less than when I was a government minister for 10 years. During that decade I always carried out my duty of representing our area with care and diligence. Along with my team I continue to deal with hundreds of constituent enquiries every week.

It's a commitment that has helped secure huge investments in Great Yarmouth. This includes government funding for the Third River Crossing, over £60 million to regenerate our town centre and much-needed A47 improvements. I'm looking forward to our new hospital being built, something I discussed with the new chairman during a visit to the James Paget this week. And I will continue to campaign on important local issues, such as fighting for better access to NHS dental treatment in the constituency. Along with Conservative councillors, I opposed the use of hotels in tourist areas to house asylum seekers whilst waiting for cases to be determined. This use of hotels has now been scrapped by the Home Office, with one of the first hotels to close in Great Yarmouth.

Yarmouth Vicarage Hub in Church Plain. The group led by Dawn Chrystal and Nicky Holmes from Belton, Ella from Gt.Yarmouth, Justine from Acle, and Carole Reeve from Gorleston are opening up more creative wellbeing groups and friendship sessions for those who are affected by stress and feelings of isolation.

The project was inspired by Dawn, who says she used to suffer really badly with increased anxiety and feelings of lethargy and lack of motivation throughout the winter months, and she knows what it feels like to feel trapped by such feelings.

For the last 25 years Dawn has helped people through one-to-one holistic therapies, with stress and feeling overwhelmed by the circumstances in their life, and it was through an everincreasing need for people to find help, that she realised that the underlying cause of a lot of the symptoms came from feeling isolated and not having someone to share with. Through this realisation, a new community venture Under One Umbrella was born.

We are really grateful to say our project, Under One Umbrella has been awarded some funding by The National Lottery Community Fund. The creative wellbeing sessions are open to anyone at any age, and are free or a small donation would be appreciated to help support this new project.

There are meditations, art for fun, singing, dance for joy, drumming, friendship groups, Reiki shares and sound baths, as well as access to natural therapies that can help and support you through the winter months.

- Be gentle on yourself, nurture and encourage yourself, and start to be more aware of what you are saying to yourself. Your words are very powerful, and can keep you in a state of disharmony if you keep repeating negative thoughts to yourself.
- If you feel stuck in a loop of negative thinking, take some time to write down what you are feeling. You can often see things more clearly when you see it written in front of you.
- Plan to learn something new. It doesn't have to be something big. Your brain produces good chemicals when you are learning a new experience.
- Plan a day out to connect with people who will lift up your spirits.
- Remember, you are important and everything you choose to do for you today will help to lift you up.

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Moorlands to be a School of Sanctuary

his year Moorlands are working towards become a recognised School of Sanctuary. This means we will be committed to creating a welcoming and inclusive culture for all students and families, including refugees and asylum seekers.



In order to achieve this, we have had several events this half term. In an assembly at the beginning of



November Mrs Larkin and Mr Biddle told the story of Omran, a 6-year-old Syrian refugee, and shared the items he took with him in his backpack when he fled his home. They then talked about what they might take with them if they were faced with a similar situation.

To follow this up we then had a non-uniform day to celebrate our School of Sanctuary work and asked the children and staff to bring in a bag containing five items that they would take with them if they had to leave home. This was a real success It was amazing to see how much thought the children had put into the items they had brought in and to hear them explain why they'd chosen each item.

Mrs Larkin, our School of Sanctuary lead, said "I'm so proud of the Moorlands pupils. They've shown fantastic empathy and a real understanding of children who are facing difficult situations. It is lovely to know how much they all care about other people."

We finished our Day of Sanctuary with a whole school assembly where the children brought their items to the hall. Some were then asked to share some of the items they had chosen and why they had selected them.



Some Notable Points of the Draft Neighbourhood Plan

- To ensure that there is a Strategic Gap between settlements e.g. between Belton/Burgh Castle and Bradwell, to prevent coalescence and urbanisation.
- New residential small-scale development should reflect local housing need and affordability, via Community-Led Development, whilst adhering to the Design Guidance and Codes incorporating low carbon design/energy efficient measures and the location's character.
- Biodiversity should be protected and enhanced.
- Local Green Spaces, as specified, will be protected from inappropriate development and retained for their environmental benefits and contribution to the area's character.
- Important Views, as specified, will be protected from inappropriate development and retained for their contribution to the area's character.
- Proposals which assist with the delivery of new or enhanced facilities to the benefit of the community will be supported.
- To protect and maintain existing, and encourage new, walking and cycling routes within the area.
- The area features numerous examples of heritage assets which significantly contribute to the area's overall character. New development must be sensitive to the local historic vernacular, in keeping with surrounding historic buildings and should not exceed the scale or massing of adjacent historic buildings.

ALL SAINTS BELTON

Rev Rosie writes

I wonder what you would wish to have for Christmas, if you could have anything?

Some of you will wish for better health: others for a loved one returned to you; still others a new car or a home of your own. If you have children or grandchildren you may already know what they want for Christmas as they will not have been shy about coming forward to tell you, especially now that the Christmas adverts are in full swing.

I wonder what would have been in the minds of Mary and Joseph, on that first Christmas morning? But of course, they wouldn't have thought about getting any Christmas gift as Jesus was their Christmas gift – the Christ who began all celebrations of Christmas.

If Mary and Joseph were asking for anything it would have been the safe arrival of their baby, and a secure place in which Mary could aive birth. Their concerns would have been whether they made it to Bethlehem in time - but God would have had that under control as his Old Testament Prophets had already told the Hebrew nation that in the Book of Micah.

"But you, Bethlehem Ephrathah, though you are small among the clans of Judah, out of you will come for me one who will be ruler over Israel, whose origins are from of old, from ancient times." Micah 5:2

Jesus was born at a time when the Romans were ruling over what is now Israel and Palestine; many of us will be familiar with the words "In those days Caesar Augustus issued a decree that a census should be taken of the entire Roman world." which comes at the beginning of the account of Jesus' birth in Luke's gospel. Life really wasn't easy for the ordinary people of that time and place, and I sometimes wonder what Joseph & Mary's reaction might have been to the census decree. I'm sure they wouldn't have welcomed it when it involved a journey of around 100 miles at that later stage of Mary's pregnancy. But they didn't have a choice so they undertook the journey.

On that first Christmas morning, Mary and Joseph had visitors they had not expected or invited. Imagine having just had a baby and a load of shepherds turn up with a sheep or two.... But their invitation had been received from God's own messengers – the Angel and the Angel choir; a heavenly Father who was pleased to announce the birth of His

Son. And we read in the Bible that Mary pondered on that experience - treasured memories for a new mum, perhaps.

Later, after the arrival of the Magi, the wise men, Mary and Joseph up-sticks and run to Egypt, having been warned by a dream that King Herod was out to kill the baby Jesus.

When you think about Jesus, do you remember that he was born in a place that wasn't home and became a refugee quite soon afterwards, perhaps settling with Jewish settlers in that area. Seeing all that we have seen on the television recently about the Rapha Crossing out of Gaza, made me think again of their escape to Egypt. For Mary and Joseph it might not have been so controlled or crowded, but crossing the border into Egypt must have brought them some anxiety. For the people being allowed out of Gaza today it brings with it real concern for family left behind and the same concern as Mary & Joseph - what are we going to do now?

So as we celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ, the Saviour of the world, perhaps we might spare some thoughts for those caught up in the current conflict. They may not know much about who Jesus is, but he will know who they are.

So what would I ask for this Christmas? That there would be found a way to resolve the conflicts between Israel and Palestine and Russia and the Ukraine..... and that my son and his family might get home from Malawi in time for Christmas.

INGREDIENTS:

100gmsSALTED BUTTER (CUBED)45 gmsGOLDEN CASTER SUGAR1 x 300mlsSINGLE CREAM2 tspsVANILLA ESSENCESmall bowl of iced WATER



- 1) Lightly grease and line a 20cm square tray with foil or baking paper.
- 2) Heat sugar, cream and butter in a saucepan for 5-6 mins. Stirring continuously until the butter has melted.
- **3)** Slowly bring to the boil, stir continuously to stop the pan catching on the bottom. Stir for 10mins until mixture darkens to a dark caramel colour.
- **4)** To test drop a teaspoon of the mixture into a glass of iced water. This should drop to the bottom of the bowl in ribbons.
- 5) If so, remove from the heat. Scoop the mixture out, and form into a soft ball.
- 6) Leave to cool for 5mins. Place back into a bowl and beat in 2 tsps of vanilla flavour. Beat until matt and not shiny and thickens.
- **7)** Spoon into the tray and flatten. Leave for 1hour then slice into 25 squares. Store in a plastic container for up to 2 weeks.

The Computer Science Department at Ormiston Venture Academy took 40 Year 10 and 5 year 9 students to The Centre of Computing History in Cambridge.

Students were divided into three groups to participate in 4 different activities throughout the day. One session included a lesson on the world's largest processor. This allowed students to consolidate their knowledge and understanding of the FDE cycle, which has just been covered in the curriculum.



This session was particularly interesting, as it allowed our students to see the Fetch Decode Execute cycle in action. It was created By James Newman between 2014-2016 and holds the Guiness World Record for the largest processor. "Computers are quite opaque, looking at them it's impossible to see how they work. What I would like to do is get inside and see what's going on. Trouble is we can't shrink down small enough to walk inside a silicon chip. But we can go the other way; we can build the thing big enough that we can walk inside it. Not only that we can also put LEDs on everything so we can see the data moving and the logic



happening. It's going to be great" - James Newman

They were also introduced to early memory and shown how technology has reduced in size and cost but increased in capabilities.

Another session included a programming lesson, controlling external objects. This was called Pi Power and took place in the 80's style classroom. This was an opportunity for students to

show off their programming skills to make a remote-controlled buggy to be

programmed and move based on inputs from the code.

The third guided session was a tour around the amazing artefacts the museum as curated. This allowed the students to add some vital contextual information to the knowledge they have gained in the classroom. Specifically seeing how computers have developed over time. Students were shocked by how large old machines and technology were and

I believe this has given them a new appreciation for the devices we use every day. Students also had the opportunity to explore the games zone, where they were able to play a timeline of game evolution, playing original versions of favourites such as Tetris, Pacman, Sonic and Street Fighter.

Head of Computer Science and Trip leader, Lewis Riches said "The Visit to The Centre of Computing History embeds itself perfectly into our curriculum adding vital contextual information to support students existing knowledge. It is a place which we have enjoyed visiting in the past and plan to continue in the future for other

groups of students. All students had a fantastic time and thoroughly enjoyed the experience! "

Students were amazing on the day and were enthusiastic in the sessions, asking questions and showing genuine interest into the subject of computing. This was really lovely to see.

RAILWAY TICKET OFFICES

Greater Anglia along with most other train operators, had been proposing changes designed to improve customer service at stations, with staff coming out from behind the ticket office window into more flexible roles, which were intended to provide a better service and more assistance for customers.

However, in the light of the objections from Transport Focus and London TravelWatch, Greater Anglia's proposed closure of ticket offices, and those of all other train operators, will be withdrawn.

There was a tremendous response to the consultation exercise including ENTUA's submission with regard to Yarmouth Vauxhall Station.

Greater Anglia added: "We thank everybody who participated in the consultation process. We have listened to and responded to the feedback we have received. We will continue to focus on other ways in which we can keep on improving the customer experience for rail travellers across our region."

ENTUA's RAIL DOCUMENT

ENTUA has put together its aspirations for rail services from Gt. Yarmouth in the next 10 years and which was launched at Gt. Yarmouth's Vauxhall Station on 21st November, 2023.

Included in its Wish List are more services between Gt. Yarmouth and Norwich operating via Reedham, including a basic shelter, seating and light provision at Berney Arms and Buckenham Station.

Some services operating direct from Gt. Yarmouth to Stansted Airport (without having to change at Norwich)

Some services operating from Gt. Yarmouth to Peterborough (without having to change at Norwich) and in the summer months some East Midlands Railway trains operating through to Gt. Yarmouth from Liverpool Lime Street.

Summer services operated by Greater Anglia on Mons, Fris and Sats to operate from late May (Whitsun) until the end of September.

At least a 10 minute window for passengers from Gt. Yarmouth arriving at Norwich and the departure of their train to other destinations and vice versa for return journeys.

A revamp of Gt. Yarmouth Vauxhall Station to make it more customer friendly and environmentally secure.

Investigate the feasibility of installing electric car charging points at Gt. Yarmouth and intermediate stations to Norwich and review car park charges in line with demand and cost effectiveness.

We are feeding this information to Greater Anglia to consider in their planning over the next 10 years.
