REFUSE COLLECTION CHANGES

Your Parish Council Reports



Belton with Browston Parish Council

The March meeting of the Parish Council took place on the first Tuesday of the month at the New Road Centre with eight of the eleven Parish Councillors present along with County Councillor Carl Annison, in the absence of the council chairman vice chair Nigel Light chaired the meeting and with the clerk also unavailable Brian Swan clerked the meeting.

The condition of Belton New Road from Waveney Drive to Bracon Road was reported to County Councillor Annison along with a long narrow pothole that needs attention at the junction of Lound Road and Browston Lane at Browston, he stated that the highways department are aware of the condition of the bank to the side of the A143 near to the piggeries that keep flooding. In a written report Borough Councillor Carpenter stated that proposal to ban all parking on verges are still progressing, a leaning tree at the Bracon Road and New Road junction has been dealt with and issues with litter bins not being emptied were due to rounds being altered along with some staff sickness problems.

In planning two sycamore trees at Browston Hall can be felled as they are

diseased, this in spite of the fact that they are covered by Tree Protection orders, replacement trees are however to be planted, there was also approval for removal of hedges and construction of a two metre high wall at Garden Villa on Browston Lane, Browston and retrospective permission for a loggia and shed at 6 Station Road South in Belton. Borough Council planners have refused permission to convert a stable block on Short Road at Browston into a C3 category residential dwelling.

Members agreed on three prospective contractors to approach for quotes so that a grant from the Hornsea 3 fund can be applied for to place solar panels on the New Road Sports Centre roof.

Various other points were noted at the New Road Centre, planning

permission for car boots on the site is still awaited from the Borough Council, due to objections any permissions will now be restricted to the car parking areas being used and any 'boots' agreed will probably be run by outside providers., Bohemians F.C have confirmed their youth football tournament will be on July 6th and 7th this year

and dogs are now permitted on the field but must be kept on leads at all times whilst permission has been granted to Bohemians to investigate grant funding for a G3 all-weather sports pitch which they think is a possibility and could be used for other sports as well as football.

Councillor Greenacre reported that the Neighbourhood Plan for the three local parishes is in the final stages of completion before it goes for official external approval which will eventually be followed by a referendum in the three parishes hopefully to receive approval from the community.

The next meeting dates are as follows: **April Parish Council Meeting** – Tuesday April 2nd.



Annual Parish Meeting – Tuesday April 30th when local groups and organisations can submit their reports on the last years activities.

Annual Parish Council Meeting – Tuesday May 7th. This is when all appointments are confirmed within the council for the coming year as well as normal monthly business taking place.

All meetings are at the New Road Sports and Leisure Centre commencing at 7.00pm details from the Parish Clerk, Kate Ruddock on 01493 602960 or e-mail beltonparish@yahoo.co.uk.

There are still two vacancies on the Council that can be filled by co-option, full information from the Clerk on the contact details above.



Burgh Castle Parish Council



S ix members of the Parish Council plus two members of the public and the Parish Clerk attended the March 11th meeting of the Parish Council at the Village Hall, Brian Swan was in the chair.

One of the members of the public raised further concerns over the speed limit on Back Lane and the lack of hedge cutting that has taken place this winter, he had spoken to Borough and County Councillors last Summer but he was concerned that it was still a 30mph road, the Chairman said that both County and Borough \councillors will be reminded of the situation on his behalf. Councillor Greenacre raised concerns on behalf of another resident over blocked dykes that run through land behind Mill Road and towards the main Stepshort dyke, both the local drainage board and the Borough Councils planning enforcement officer will be contacted as this might be caused by unauthorised filling near to the main dyke.

In planning Councillors felt that they could not object in principle to plans for a stable block to be converted to residential behind Windale on Back Lane however they asked for a condition to go on to any approval that it only be used in connection with the main property. Members were pleased to see a tree protection order had been placed on a group of specimens at Burgh Castle Marina, land under planning control of the Broads Authority. Between meetings members had raised objections to proposed increased hours of trading for entertainment facilities at the Cherry Tree Holiday Park based on extra noise and light pollution and these comments were minuted and confirmed.

The Rev. Bunn has agreed in principle to dedicating the new tree planted on the Playing Field to commemorate the Kings Coronation and suggested that this takes place near to the first anniversary of the coronation, members felt that a good time would be on either a Thursday or Friday morning when the Village Hall is open to the public, members also agreed on the details of the plaque and accepted a quotation for its supply.

The Chairman reported that the steering committee should have the final draft of the Neighbourhood Plan back with them later this week for a final members read through before it is submitted for official checking which must take place ahead of aa residents referendum throughout the three local parishes and its subsequent coming into effect.



Members agreed to accept the offer from Folkes to place a new defibrillator outside the Welcome Pit on Butt Lane, they have also offered to do the installation and electrical works, the Chinese take away will be thanked for also offering to have it on their building but the was considered to be too far back from the road to be seen easily. The up to date costs of a unit will be brought back to the next meeting when funding options will be considered further.

The Clerk had received an e-mail just too late for last months meeting from Norfolk County Council saying that changes were expected to the Service 5 bus route from May to take into effect the new Herring Bridge and Bus Service Improvement Plan funding, the idea of reinstating the full original afternoon trips on Service 5 is still on the table.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be on Monday April 8th commencing at 7.30pm at the Village Hall on Church Road, The Annual Parish Meeting will take place on Monday May 13th (7.30pm) followed directly by the Annual Parish Council Meeting for details contact Kate Ruddock, the Parish Clerk, on 07948705218, e-mail burghcastleclerk@gmail.com.

NAVIGATING PET FOOD LABELS: A GUIDE FOR UK PET OWNERS

Selecting the right food for your companion is a crucial aspect of responsible pet care. You will find when you go to look there are a multitude of options available on the market. The labels can include confusing jargon making an informed decision can be challenging. Understanding pet food labels is essential to ensure that your pet receives the nutrition they need to thrive. In this guide, we'll break down the key components of pet food labels in the UK to empower you to make the best choices for your beloved pets.

The front of the bag will hook you into looking at the food more closely. Perhaps there is an appealing photo, or a bold headline such as 'hypoallergenic'. It might even claim to be a certain flavour, for example, salmon. Like most marketing this is designed to draw you in. If you want to know the truth of what is in the food, you need to look at it with more detail. Pet food labels only provide you with limited information, legally they don't have to include everything. If you are buying a smaller bag, let's say a 2kg bag instead of a larger 12kg bag there might also be differences. The 12kg bag is more likely to include a complete ingredients list. In the UK pet food is governed by the UK Pet Food who work to advance pet health. There is guidance set out for food labels, you can read more by

clicking here. On the front the food should clearly state what species it is made for and if the food is complementary or complete

INGREDIENTS LIST

When you turn the bag around you will find the ingredient list, the first important part to read. This provides insight into what exactly goes into the food you're feeding your pet. Ingredients are typically listed in descending order by weight, with the primary ingredient listed first. Look for whole, recognisable ingredients, meat or carbohydrate should be listed first (depending on your dog's requirements). Avoid foods that list ambiguous terms like "meat by-products" or "animal derivatives," as these can encompass a variety of less desirable parts (such as beaks and feet). Ideally the meat content is 18% minimum, again this will depend on your dog's needs or existing health issues. Anything less than 18% is a good indication of other hidden or nasties included in the food to make it tasty and appealing to your pet. This can even include hidden sugars which is addictive plus contributes to obesity and diabetes. You can also check if the meat listed in the ingredients is the same as the hook on the front of the bag. There are occasions where a food is labelled as fish, but chicken is the main ingredient with just a flavour of fish.

ANALYTICAL CONSTITUENTS

Pay close attention to this information and compare it to



the listed ingredients. This part lists the percentage of what is included in the food after preparation. This list will help you decide if the food is what it sets itself out to be, does it meet the dietary needs you are after, is it value for money? How much percent of protein is listed, does this match the percent of protein listed in the ingredients? If it doesn't how different is this percentage to the main ingredients? You will also find the level of fat, fibre, moisture (if it is over 14%, under this doesn't have to be listed) and the crude ash (various minerals). It is also a good idea to avoid foods high in fat (under 14%) as this can lead to obesity and other health issues. Some diets are also quite high in ash, though dogs need vitamins increased ash has been linked with some health issues such as urinary stones. In other instances, such as a dog with pancreatitis the ash content phosphorus needs to be low. Read the full article at www.kateyaldred.co.uk/navigating-petfood-labels/



he recent press coverage and accompanying photos of the awarding of the Buchan Medal to the last surviving Royal Lancer to see service in WW2 and Burgh Castle resident Walter Flaxman, has lead to an eagle-eyed member of the armed forces noticing Walter was missing a medal due from his WW2 service. It would seem that with Walter being



hastily demobbed at the end of the war so he could get back to work as a farm labourer he was overlooked in being presented the Africa Star. This is a military campaign medal awarded to members of the British and Commonwealth armed forces who served in North Africa for at least one day between 10 June 1940 and 12 May 1943. Since Walter arrived in Algeria in late 1942 as part of 1st Army, he qualified for this medal, seeing active service there for several months.

Thankfully after receiving a report of the missing medal Lieutenant Colonel (Retd) Nick Everard

the Regimental Secretary of The Royal Lancers (Queen Elizabeths' Own) has now rectified the omission and Walter has been presented with his Africa Star. The photo shows it (second from Walter's left) alongside his 39/45 Star issued for 6 months operational service, the Italy Star issued for operational service in Italy and the War medal issued for 30 days service in the Armed forces or Merchant Navy.

ALL SAINTS BELTON Rev Rosie writes . .

Easter! When I talk about Easter with many people it might be about the cost of Easter eggs these days, or the fact that they seem to get smaller as the years go by; some people have spoken about the fact that Hot Cross Buns are now available all year round, when they used to be something special to be enjoyed in the weeks run up to Easter. For some, Easter is about the school holidays or the long weekend that comes with Easter of two Bank holidays.

As a child, Easter marked the beginning of the holiday season and my Dad's focus on getting the boats ready and launched, having had them pulled out and worked on over the winter months. I have pictures of the boatvard in the weeks before Easter in 1963 (I think) when everything was frozen and the men were working hard to break the ice so that the boats could be put in. Easter was always busy but there was a priority made of going to church on Easter Day.

If Easter eggs are what you enjoy, I hope you have enjoyed eating it/them. The sad thing is that they are so quickly gone if we are not careful.

The church focuses on the events of Easter Day and the days that follow for Jesus and the disciples for nearly seven weeks. We think about what happened that first Easter Day, from the perspective of Mary Magdalene (who is the first witness of the risen Jesus). We think about how Jesus' appearing in a locked room to the disciples, twice (the second time for the benefit of Thomas and his doubts) changes their whole perspective on life and where, being followers of Jesus, life would take them. There are appearances where Jesus teaches those disciples as he walks along the Emmaus road with them; one where he cooks breakfast for some of them who had been out fishing overnight but caught nothing; and a conversation he has with Peter, which restores Peter's relationship with Jesus, and gives Peter a new focus and purpose in life.

For those who were present in Jerusalem on the first

And the mission of Jesus Christ to reveal God's love for and to everyone continues.

Easter is so important but it is only when held together with the birth of Jesus, God's Son, that the significance of God's love for each one of us can truly be seen. And our hope for the future is underlined!



English Open Judo Championship 2024



18-year-old Ryan King, from Dominic King Judo & MMA Academy, entered the English Open Judo Championships recently and came away with the gold medal after a fantastic performance. Ryan from Bradwell, described it as his greatest achievement to date, despite having won Commonwealth gold and British silver medals in previous years.

This felt different because, not only was it a stacked weight category full of high-level

competitors, but Ryan won every match in style with a full Ippon score (the equivalent to a knockout in boxing). His final match was against Lewis Fryer, the current British Champion, who had also won each match by Ippon leading up to the final. Lewis entered the match as the favourite, not just because he was British Champion, but also because only one year earlier, Lewis had thrown the Youth Olympic Champion for Ippon during a match in Germany.

Despite his formidable reputation, Ryan felt totally confident that he could take the title, as he had studied Lewis many times and even trained with him during National Squad training sessions. Ryan was even confident enough call the grip and throw that he was going to use to win the match and discussed this with his coach (and father) Dominic. So, when the match began, even Dominic was amazed when Ryan launched Lewis with the throw that he had predicted less than 10 seconds into the match. The referee immediately gave Ippon, but after watching the replay the judges down-graded it to waza-ari (half a point). This was due to a slight over-rotation because the throw was so big. This meant that the match continued, which should have been a mental blow for Ryan and a boost for Lewis, but instead Ryan remained in full control, almost scoring on several occasions while skilfully avoiding Lewis' dangerous groundwork attacks. A few minutes into the match Ryan secured the grip that he had used at the beginning, which made Lewis think that the same throw was on its way. Ryan knew this and dummied the throw before executing one of his other favourite attacks. Lewis fell for the dummy and Ryan expertly dumped him flat onto his back for Ippon. There was no dispute this time and Ryan became the English Open Champion.



Lewis is older than Ryan and is currently National Lottery funded, which allows him to train full-time. Ryan is fully committed to judo too but must teach 1-1 classes and accept some casual work to help pay for his training. He has turned down educational opportunities and well-paid work so that he can pursue his goal, which is to become an Olympian and win the gold medal.

So far this year Ryan has attended competitions and training camps in Kendal, Scotland, Poland, Walsall, Denmark and London and is currently training back in the Midlands this week. In the coming weeks, Ryan will be entering a high-level international event in Bremen, Germany and a European Cup event in Lithuania where he is hoping to work his way up the world ranking list.

All this travel is extremely costly, and Ryan is desperately searching for financial backing. He has received a few grants and had help from friends who have organised fundraisers, which of course is massively appreciated. Open-Top Service 1c Seafront

First Eastern Counties will be re-introducing its seafront (open top bus) Service 1c with effect from 4th May, 2024. This very popular route operates from Pleasure Beach along Gt. Yarmouth seafront to Seashore Holiday Park. At its peak it will operate 2 services through to Hemsby Beach and will probably operate through to end of September. More details to follow as we get them.

Bus stops on A149 Acle New Road outside entrance to Railway Station

Work started on Monday 4th March, 2024 to create a new bus stop lay-by with a shelter and real-time passenger information constructed on the eastern (southbound) side of the A149 Acle New Road between the station access road and the Vauxhall Roundabout. The scheme also includes accessibility improvements to a new bus stop on the opposite carriageway (northbound) side of A149 Acle New Road between the station access road and Fullers Hill Roundabout. Part of the scheme will see the installation of a real-time information system within the rail station directing passengers to the bus stops on the road outside the station.

Councillor Graham Plant, Norfolk County Council Cabinet Member for highways, infrastructure and transport said "Through our Bus Service Improvement Plan we are committed to improving bus services and sustainable transport facilities across the county and this is the first infrastructure scheme to be delivered in Great Yarmouth under this funding"

Works are expected to last for up to 11 weeks with a lane closure in place on the outbound side of the Acle New Road for the duration of works but all traffic management will be removed during the Easter holidays and May Day weekend.

As many of you will know ENTUA has fought over many years for an all year bus link from the Rail Station to the Town Centre. In the past the best we have achieved is a Summer only service initially with First Eastern Counties Service 3 going to Town Centre, Vauxhall Holiday Park and Hemsby Beach, then in later years `OurBus` Service 100 operating to Vauxhall Holiday Park, Town Centre and Britannia Pier. Each year it has been limited to the main Summer months and always with a NCC subsidy.

ENTUA would have preferred a bus service going directly into the station, however I think this is about the best we are going to achieve. On the plus side passengers will not have to walk from the station up The Conge with heavy suitcases to Market Gates, instead they will have a short walk out onto the A149. For local residents living on the route of the X1/X11 and needing to catch a train, there is a regular service to the Station. All X1/X11 buses to and from Norwich will stop at these bus stops outside the station. – for details of this project, including a public information notice with details of traffic management for the work, visit www.norfolk.gov.uk/gybuslink

Electroliner Buses for Norwich

If you have visited Norwich recently you may have noticed an increasing number of double deck Electroliner buses in operation. By the end of March, 70 of these battery operated electric buses will be in service. All of the major through city routes will be operated using these new buses. NCC have said "the use of these new buses will reduce CO2 emissions by more than 80,000 tonnes. Thats the equivalent of taking 4,700 small petrol or diesel cars off the road and improving air quality in Norwich". A further 16 single deck electric buses are due to be delivered by Easter.

No electric buses for Gt. Yarmouth in the current plans but we will benefit from the cascading of more newer Gemini B9s from Norwich to this area which have more fuel efficient Euro 6 engines causing less emissions than the older buses. You may notice some buses in the town with their Norwich logos still in place.

£2.00 Maximum Single Fare

This bus fare cap has been extended to 31st December, 2024 across all participating operators. For any single journey within the area covered by First Eastern Counties or Borderbus you only pay a maximum ± 2.00 single fare. Some single journeys are less eg Belton to JPH is ± 1.50 single. When you consider the difficulties in parking at the James Paget Hospital, using the bus is cheaper and less stressful and concession pass holders can travel there for free.

As the Spring approaches it is worth considering taking an X11 from Belton to Norwich for £2.00 each way, just £4.00 return, you could even have as glass of wine with your meal! and cheaper than the cost of fuel and parking – worth thinking about!

East Anglia Transport Museum

In last months issue we gave advanced notice of the Easter family treasure trail (Fri 29th – Sun 31st March, 2024) and the 1960s event Saturday and Sunday 11/12th May. February, 2024 saw the 150th anniversary of London Liverpool Station which opened in February, 1874. A special ceremony was held to mark this milestone and the start of a number of initiatives this year to celebrate the crucial role the station has played for millions of people throughout its history. Notable events over the station's life to date were highlighted, including its role as the arrival point for those being rescued as part of the Kindertransport initiative in1938 and the major redevelopment project for the station from 1986-1991.

As Liverpool Street is now the busiest station on the entire UK network, it feels like a timely and appropriate year to have attained that accolade.




