Your Parish Council Reports

Belton with Browston Parish Council



The April meeting of the Parish Council took place on the 2nd of the month at the New Road Sport and Leisure Centre with ten of the eleven Parish Councillors present along with Borough Councillor Graham Carpenter, five members of the public and the Parish Clerk.

Residents were present to raise concerns about the recent clearance to the small plot at the entrance to Rosedale Gardens, no planning proposals have been received and it was generally felt that the site was too small to accommodate and development.

The Neighbourhood Plan Committee Chairman had provided the Council with suggested revised and updated objections to the revised plans for developments at Browston Hall incorporating views received about holiday developments at the plans public consultation stage and it was agreed to use this as the updated objections document for all three linked applications, Councillor Carpenter will also ask at Borough if a further extension to the closing date for objections can be given due to the vast number of documents on line in relation to these proposals.

In other planning matters the Borough Council have approved demolition of a conservatory and a new rear extension at 6 Fern Gardens but have refused both conversion of two stable blocks to one dwelling at Five Acres, Cherry Lane, Browston and retention of a single story extension and change of the garage roof to a pitched one at 12 Ranworth Close, Belton.

In Highway matter Borough Councillor Carpenter reported that New Road from Bracon Road to the Stepshort roundabout will be surface dressed in 2024 and Bracon Road itself is being checked for the 2025 listing of similar

At the New Road Centre, it was agreed to delay a grant application till November for possible solar panels as only one quote had been received and the deadline for the current round of

applications is getting too near. Repairs to the roof of the toilet block were agreed, urgent essential repairs that had been made to the function room floor were noted and it was agreed not to renew the premises license at present as it had not been used in the last year, it holds on file for 4 years but later renewal will require payment of any backdated

NHS Norfolk had confirmed that they would like to bring the 'Wellness on Wheels" bus to the New Road Centre but would like to link it to suitable other activities therefore the Monday Morning (Exercise) and Thursday afternoon (Stroke Group) dates will be provided.


Annual Parish Council Meeting – Tuesday May 7th. this is when all appointments are confirmed within the council for the coming year as well as normal monthly business taking place.

Burgh Castle Parish Council



Six members of the Parish Council plus County Councillor Carl Smith, one member of the public and the Parish Clerk attended the April 8th meeting of the Parish Council at the Village Hall, Brian Swan was in the chair.

In highways matters the general condition of the junction of Market Road with High Road is going to be reported along with issues with the footpaths on both Stepshort and Butt Lane. There are still roadworks signs laying where the Crows Farm corner works on High Road took place last year and County Highways will be asked to collect them. Four areas of roadway were marked out for resurfacing on Butt Lane near to Melbreak, the work to be completed in that last financial year which finished on April 1st, however only part of one area was repaired and highways are to be asked when the remainder will be dealt with, a road closure order will probably be required. County Councillor Smith reported that replacement posts will be placed round the grass near to the Butt Lane flats, the existing ones are rotting away.

Councillors were angered by the mysterious appearance of a 6ft wide gap that has been made in the hedge between the Parish Burial Ground and the Churchyard, nobody gave permission for the hedge to be opened up, the work was carried out very neatly however the Council and the Parochial Church Council will now have to foot the bill to get it closed off again. Ther Chairman had reported the incident to the police and they or the Council would like to hear from anybody with any information concerning those involved in the damage.

The Chairman reported that it would appear that the village is going to get an improved bus service from May, the County Council have advised that they are awaiting information on what is proposed from operators First Bus and councillors hope that this will bring to an end the need to change afternoon services every school day in term time to permit children from Lynn Grove Academy to get home to Belton.

In Planning members supported all objections made by neighbouring Belton with Browston Council to go against the three holiday related planning applications for Browston Hall. In the first draft of the updated Boroughwide Plan members were pleased to see that out of the many areas of land in Burgh Castle put forward for development only a small strip behind Louis Dhal Road large enough for 20 residential propertys has been put into the latest consultation document and the chairman reported that the

Neighbourhood Plan which is specific to the three parishes of Belton with Browston, Burgh Castle and Fritton with St Olaves has now been submitted to the Borough Council for formal examination before a referendum is called and it hopefully it is voted into effect by residents of those parishes.

Following on from last month when it was reported that Folkes Plant and Aggregates had given permission for a defibrillator unit to be placed outside the Welcome Pit on Butt Lane members received confirmation from Heart2Heart Norfolk that a new unit will cost £1500, they agreed that all local businesses will be contacted and asked to consider making a donation towards the unit and that an application would be made to the Village Voice magazine for a grant as they currently have funds available to local groups and organisations.

The next parish meetings will be on Monday May 13th at the Village Hall, on Church Road, The Annual Parish Meeting will commence at 7.30pm, this will include two public resolutions to be voted on by residents to permit the linking of the charities running the Playing Field and the Village Hall. It is hoped that village residents will attend and vote in favour of these important resolutions. That meeting will be followed directly at about 7.45pm by the Annual Parish Council Meeting for details contact Kate Ruddock, the Parish Clerk, on 07899846148, e-mail burghcastleclerk@gmail.com.

even Parish Councillors, the Parish Clerk and four members of the public attended the Fritton and St Olaves Annual Parish Meeting on March 21st. in his annual report Parish Council chairman Stannas Bellaby stated that in the May 2023 Parish Council elections resulted in four new Parish Councillors, Hayley Carruthers, Nigel Barnes, Bob Betts and John Wadeson as well as new Borough Councillors, Graham Carpenter and Ivan Murray-Smith being elected at the same time.

Councillor Bellaby thanked County Councillor Annison for getting the A143 resurfaced at St Olaves footpath improvements by Fritton Village hall and other works. He stated that there are now also bollards by the Fritton Village sign to prevent parking. He went on to say that Councillors Richards, Carruthers and himself had been working on the three parishes Neighbourhood Plan committee and following work by led by Mr Ken Botwright the plan was very near to submission to the Borough Council. In closing he thanked all councillors and the Parish Clerk for their work during the year.

Other reports were filed by both Fritton and St Olaves Village Halls, St Edmunds Church at Fritton, Fritton Poorlands and St Margarets Church at Herringfleet.

The chairman reported that Mr Keith Nunn was in the process of forming a new enlarged committee to run The Fritton Village Hall and that they were due to meet on March 29th.

PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

The monthly Parish Council meeting followed the Annual Parish Meeting, also chaired by Councillor Bellaby, there were seven Parish Councillors and two members of the public present Stannas Bellaby was in the chair.

In the public section a member of the public along with his wife offered to join the revised Fritton Village Hall committee and he was reminded of its forthcoming meeting.

A member of the public raised concerns about money being wasted by the Borough Council sending letters about bin





collection changes as well as producing slips to place on bins when they were last emptied. Marion Binding, a volunteer litter picker had met the clerk and as a result it was agreed to purchase high visibility vests and if the Borough Council will not fund them then the Parish Council will pay, also to check if the group of four people would be covered on the Parish Councils insurance and finally on the topic Borough Councillor Carpenter will be contacted over collection arrangements for the bags of litter.

Councillor Stevens felt that the recent road improvement markings at Fritton discussed at the previous meeting should have been extended further. Also, in highways matters a resident had asked if signage indicating passing rather than parking areas for two locations on Church Lane, Fritton and blocked gullies near the piggeries, a pothole and bank damage on the A143 were some of the other highway's matters reported along with a large dip on New Road by the chicken factory that needs filling and the fact that the same road is now some 2 feet wider in laces due to wide pig farm equipment using the road. A reduction of the speed to 20mph on Fritton New Road will again be requested although it has been turned down once before along with finding out from the volunteers when the SAM2 machine will be back on that road.

In Planning matters there were no objections to a single storey extension for a wet room at Redroof on Priory Road, St Olaves, permission has been granted for a change of use at St Olaves Caravan Park at Priory Farm to provide 30 touring caravan spaces with associated works and a Tree Preservation Order has been confirmed on land at Waveney Forest House, New Road, Fritton. Members were advised of details of the consultation on the first draft of the revised new Local Boroughwide Plan.

highlights the profound emotional intelligence of these remarkable animals. It is this that makes some candidates suitable as an assistance dog.






Beavers

Belton Judo club latest news update

It's been another successful month for Dominic King Judo & MMA Academy, which has involved members attending different events and accomplishing various achievements. Many of our youngest participants have attained new judo grades, we've had members travel to Wisbech for a grappling tournament and bring home medals and current English Open Champion, Ryan King, recently fought in the Bremen International Masters competition in Germany, which is one of the toughest junior events in the world. Unfortunately, Ryan was narrowly defeated by his Azerbaijani opponent in the first round after leading the match. The Azerbaijan team are probably the world's most successful nation at junior level (even more successful than the Japanese), so it was no disgrace, but it's important to add that the British competitor who managed to win the silver medal at this event, was the same fighter he beat convincingly in the English Open final only a month ago. So despite the disappointment of a first round defeat, Ryan knows he is definitely able to compete at the highest level Internationally.

However, our Academy is not all about our competitors. During the Easter break we organised another enjoyable fun day, which was attended by a good number of children, plus a few "big kids" AKA adults. We believe that the ongoing success of our club is due to our ability to make every single member feel special regardless of their age or level. Local NEWS in Brief

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN UPDATE

The Neighbourhood Plan for Belton with Browston, Burgh Castle, and Fritton with St Olaves has now (17/4/24) been formally submitted to Great Yarmouth Borough Council and the Broads Authority. GYBC will now consult statutory bodies approximately 6 weeks, then it will undergo an independent examination (the examiner will be independent of the neighbourhood planning group and the authority, appropriately qualified and experienced) approximately 4 weeks, then a referendum will be held.

Once the neighbourhood plan has been made (approved) by the local planning authority, independently examined, and after a successful referendum, the neighbourhood plan becomes part of the statutory development plan for the area, alongside the local plan. GREATER ANGLIA

Greater Anglia`s excellent performance continues with annual punctuality at 94.6% with four routes attaining over 97%. Latest figures highlighting the ongoing excellent punctuality standards being delivered for customers across East Anglia, despite a period which saw more storms and extreme weather.

Using the Public Performance Measure (PPM – which records arrivals of trains at their destination station), moving annual average punctuality at Greater Anglia (GA) is now at 94.6% - continuing the historically high results they have delivered for the last four years.

Exceptional annual results of over 97% or over have been achieved on four routes:

•	Norwich to Great Yarmouth	98.3%
•	Marks Tey to Sudbury	98.1%
•	Norwich to Sheringham	97.3%
•	Norwich to Lowestoft	97.1%

The impressive results are also evident using the more challenging `Time to 3` performance measure – which measures the arrival within 3 minutes of every single train at every single station it serves. On this measure Greater Anglia`s annual performance is 94.3%.

Greater Anglia are pleased to be introducing more services and improving journey times from June, 2024 as they continue to increase timetables in line with recovering customer demand following the pandemic.

Key improvements will include:-

- Additional weekday evening peak services from London Southend, Southminster, Witham and Ipswich.
- Faster journey times between Norwich and London with most off-peak services timed for 1 hour 47 minutes.
- 0800 from Norwich to London and 1700 London to

Norwich services back to under 1 hour 40 minutes

- Off-peak Clacton to London services will call at Hythe – offering better links for the University of Essex.
- Normal peak Summer season additional services on Mondays, Fridays and Saturdays between Norwich and Great Yarmouth.
- Normal peak Summer season additional Sunday morning services between Ipswich and Peterborough..

EAST ANGLIA TRANSPORT MUSEUM

In a previous issue of Village Voice we stated that the admission prices to the Museum were Adults = £10, Seniors (Over 60s) = £9.00 and children 5-15 = £7.00.
Unfortunately when we wrote that article we were not aware that the Museum had increased the

admission prices for 2024 and are now: Adults = £12.00, Seniors (over 60s) = £10.00, but children 5-15 are still £7.00, under 5s = free

The Museum has regrettably increased its admission prices due to soaring energy and utility costs, but even then these prices still represent extremely good value for money when compared to other local attractions.

In last months issue we also stated that a miniature steam rally with possibly a model railway exhibition was planned for the 8th/9th June, 2024. Unfortunately as the site will not be in good enough physical condition to support this event, the Museum has regrettably had to withdraw the miniature steam rally from the events calendar.

CAPPED SINGLE BUS FARES

As you may have seen in the local media, single bus fares for the Great Yarmouth town zone have been capped at £1.50. This is being subsidised by Norfolk County Council through its BSIP (Bus Service Improvement Programme). We do not yet know how long this will last for. The capped single fare applies to journeys started and finished in the Great Yarmouth zone which covers all of Caister, Gt. Yarmouth, Gorleston, Bradwell, Belton and Burgh Castle. All three operators that service the town, FIRST, SANDERS AND BORDERBUS have signed up to the scheme.

If you travel outside the zone the capped single fare is still £2.00.

SERVICE 1c GREAT YARMOUTH SEAFRONT

As mentioned in a previous article First Eastern Counties will be operating its `open top` seafront service from 4th May, 2024 on a 20 minute frequency between Pleasure Beach and Seashore Holiday Park with an hourly frequency going through to Hemsby. The full service with 4 buses per hour along the seafront and 2 per hour through to Hemsby will start on 25th May, 2024.

There will be some changes to local bus services on 26th May, but details are not available as we go to press. More information to follow in June's Village Voice ENTUA article.
