

Parish Council Reports

Monthly Reports from all your Local Parish Councils Belton, Browston, Burgh Castle, Fritton & St Olaves

Belton with Browston Parish Council



The latest monthly meeting of the Parish Council was held on July 1st with eight Parish Councillors present along with four members of the public and the Parish Clerk. David Mills was in the chair.

In the public section a resident asked if a staggered barrier could be installed in Wensum Way in an attempt to stop electronic bikes being ridden along one of the footpaths, this will be passed on to the County Highways Engineer. A resident advised that the area round the memorial seat by the village sign is now becoming overgrown and untidy and with the resident who used to maintain it as a community gardener no longer able to care for the area it was agreed that the Parish Council now takes over responsibility for its upkeep. Borough Councillor Carpenter had advised that bollards had been installed round the grass in Fern Gardens however the possibility of railings round the grass on Rosedale Gardens is being reconsidered by County Highways to see if a more ethically pleasing scheme can be devised.

Members agreed that the inbuilt trampoline on Bell Lane Playing Field should be removed as the Borough Council are no longer able to undertake the necessary repairs and it is not viable to use the original suppliers who are based in Kent.

Parish Councillors attendance percentage is 82.3% Possible meetings attended vary due to resignations and co-options.

Regarding the future of Belton Rectory the Clerk reported that in a reply the Archdeacon had stated that it is believed that expensive maintenance is required and a survey has been commissioned before its future is decided, the carbon footprint of older houses will also be taken into account when any decision is taken.

In planning there were no objections raised to go to the Borough Council on any of the following three applications:- 19 Bramble Gardens (certificate of of lawful existence or development for a sun room attached to a two story side extension), 3 Amhurst Gardens (single story rear extension) and High House, Lound Road, Browston (work to trees covered by a preservation order – two trees - fell and replace). A new Tree Preservation Order on 11 specimens at Cliftonville, Stepshort, Belton was noted.

Highways issues included a request for updates about the recent resurfacing in the village, areas of Bracon Road had been missed due to parked vehicles, Fern Gardens had been marked out but not resurfaced and Station Road North had also not been resurfaced as expected. There are also a number of 'trip hazards' on serveral pavements in the village.

Various issues at the New Road Centre were discussed, further quotes are required for both the gully repair and possible installation of a height barrier and further quotes are also needed to attend to works in the toilet block.

With the usual rest in August the next council meeting will take place on Tuesday September 2nd, 7.00pm at the New Road Sports and Leisure Centre details from the Parish Clerk, Kate Ruddock on 01493 602960 or e-mail clerk@beltonwithbrowston-pc.gov.uk. There are still two vacancies on the Parish Council that can be filled by co-option, full details from the Clerk, details as above.

Burgh Castle Parish Council



The July meeting of the Council was held at the Village Hall on the 14th, attended the six current Parish Councillors, and the Parish Clerk, Brian Swan was in the chair. Also present was David Mattison who was co-opted on to the council to bring it back to its full quota of seven members.

There was a long discussion on the future of the three flower beds by the village sign, the council has advertised over the last two years for a volunteer gardener to take over their upkeep but with no suitable applicant coming forward it was agreed that it was not worth readvertising and that the beds will be cleared and grassed over this coming Autumn (the bulbs will be left to come through the grass in the spring)

In planning matters there were three new applications before councillors to comment to the Borough Council, Milbur, Mill Road, extension to an existing horse shelter (no objections), 12 acre site on Mill Road, adjoining the hatchery, retrospective application for change of use to dog exercise park (by majority no objections to the revised plans which show the old access closed up and a fully splayed new access being constructed however a request that a time limit be set for completion of the works be added to the conditions will be sent to the Borough Council) and land on Butt Lane between Roman Way and Cement Cottages, retrospective permission for a new entrance and alterations to the existing entrance, (no objections in principle but all entrance splays to be constructed in accordance with highways guidance,)

Plans approved by the Borough Council were Bright Eyes, Mill Road (retrospective permission for new front fence and permission for proposed gates), Braewood, High Road, (construction of block of seven residential flats for assisted living in conjunction with Burgh House, the adjoining property) and Breydon View, Market Road, (prior approval for conversion of an agricultural building to one residential property).

Councillor Hogg offered to secure a barrier into the gap that has again been forced into the hedge between the burial ground and churchyard whilst the clerk was instructed to obtain a quotation for a permanent fence panel in time for the September meeting.

There were no updates on a request to better position the new horse signs on Back Lane, this will be chased up along with a new request for a similar sign on Butt Lane outside Cement Cottages due to the bend in the road, members noted that the new posts have been installed outside the flats on Butt Lane, however the Chairman stated that with only the missing ones replaced he felt that this would be an ongoing issue with some of the older ones rotting off. A further attempt is to be made to get Millfields Footpath cleared of nettles by the restrictor barrier and the long standing spoil heap removed from the path itself.

There seems to be no truth in the story that the first bus stop on Butt Lane, Burgh Castle (service 3) outside Marric is to be removed as First Bus management have stated that they are not aware of any such plans although their enquires to find the source of the story are said to be 'ongoing'. Councillor Titterington raised concerns about double deck buses being used at some times as they are having to use the centre of the

road to avoid overhanging trees. Members were disappointed that their latest request to increase the number of discounted parking permits issued by Norfolk Archaeological Trust has fell on deaf ears, Council suggested that any income generated could go to refurbishing the seat that overlooks Breydon.

At the end of the meeting Councillor Bob Grimmer announced that for personal reasons this would be his last attendance at a Council meeting after over 20 years' service, chairman, Brian Swan, thanked him for his time on the Council and wished him all the best for the future.

WHY MORE PEOPLE ARE CHOOSING DOGS OVER CHILDREN: PSYCHOLOGY, OXYTOCIN & THE RISE OF PET PARENTING

In many parts of the world, the decision to raise a dog rather than have children is becoming more than a personal lifestyle choice it's a widespread cultural shift. From declining birth rates to increasing pet ownership, and from dog birthday parties to pet insurance, dogs have become central figures in many households. But what's really going on psychologically, socially, and even hormonally? Here's a closer look at the research shaping our understanding of this modern phenomenon.

THE DOG AS CHILD: PET PARENTING AND EMOTIONAL KINSHIP

The language people use to describe their dogs has changed dramatically. Terms like "dog mum," "fur baby," and "canine kid" are no longer fringe expressions. In many homes, dogs are emotionally and functionally equivalent to children. This trend is often referred to as pet parenting the act of raising a pet in the same nurturing and attentive way one might raise a child.

Peterson and Engwall (2019) found that voluntarily childfree women often turn to pets for fulfilment of maternal instincts, experiencing feelings they described as "peternal" (a blend of pet and maternal). Their dogs serve as emotional dependents, offering affection and routine without the demands of child-rearing (Peterson & Engwall, 2019).

Volsche (2019) went further to show that the emotional intensity of pet bonds can rival and even replace parental urges, especially in urbanised and high-income societies (Volsche, 2019).

FERTILITY TRENDS AND THE RISE IN DOG OWNERSHIP

This shift in perception coincides with another well-documented trend: falling birth rates. Across many developed nations, fertility rates have dropped below replacement level. In parallel, pet ownership especially of dogs has sharply increased.

A study by Guo et al. (2021) found that stronger pet attachment is negatively correlated with fertility intentions. Individuals who reported strong bonds with their pets were more likely to delay or forgo having children altogether (Guo et al., 2021). This suggests that dogs are not just companions, for some, they are replacements for human offspring in both function and emotional weight.

CANINES FILLING HUMAN SOCIAL AND EMOTIONAL NEEDS

Dogs are uniquely positioned to meet the emotional and social needs that children traditionally fulfil. They offer unconditional affection, routine, and a sense

responsibility and

without children. These relationships often include elements like co-sleeping, shared mealtimes, and routines typically reserved for human family members (Videla, 2020).

PARENTING STYLES TRANSFERRED TO DOGS

Many owners not only care for their dogs like children but also raise them using parenting models borrowed directly from human childcare. Dogs now go to training schools, wear GPS trackers, and are celebrated with gifts on birthdays. Research by Kuo and Kessler (2024) demonstrated that human parenting styles are often projected onto dogs, with "helicopter parenting" being surprisingly common in dog owners (Kuo & Kessler, 2024). Volsche et al. (2023) similarly found that pet owners often experience parenting-related emotions such as stress and joy in direct correlation to their pet's behaviour and wellbeing (Volsche et al., 2023). Those of you reading this will very likely have experienced the stress of an unwell canine companion and the worry that can follow.

A BIOLOGICAL BOND: OXYTOCIN AND DOG ATTACHMENT

Recent research has shown that the bond between humans and dogs is not just emotional, it's chemical. When people interact affectionately with their dogs, through eye contact, touch, or speech, both species experience elevated levels of oxytocin, the hormone associated with social bonding and attachment. Nagasawa et al. (2009) famously demonstrated that mutual gaze between dogs and their owners increases oxytocin levels in both, mirroring the hormonal feedback loop seen between parents and infants (Nagasawa et al., 2009).

Further studies show that dogs exhibit separation distress, including crying or howling, especially due to attachment style with their owners (Katayama et al., 2019). This can lead to vocalisation which is a sign of social dependency, intensified by oxytocin-mediated bonding (Katayama et al., 2019). Additionally, emotional contagion, the ability of dogs to mirror the emotions of their owners has been observed and linked to shared oxytocin pathways (Handlin et al., 2015) (Handlin et al., 2015)

A NOTE ON ANTHROPOMORPHISM: DOGS ARE DOGS

As loving as these relationships are, experts caution against over-humanising dogs. Anthropomorphism, the act of attributing human thoughts and emotions to animals can lead to misunderstandings and even harm. While dogs form deep bonds with us, they are not small humans. They need structure, boundaries, and species-appropriate care. Respecting dogs for what they are, emotionally intelligent, socially attuned animals means caring for them on THEIR terms, not ours.

THE EVOLVING ROLE OF DOGS IN HUMAN LIFE

Historically, dogs served as hunters, guards, or status symbols. Today, they are integrated into the emotional core of family life. Bone (2018) argues that for many, dogs are now a primary form of kinship, no longer an accessory but a central relationship around which people structure their lives (Bone, 2018). This isn't simply about fewer people having kids. It's about how dogs have come to meet needs, emotional, psychological, even hormonal that humans once fulfilled exclusively through children.

Wallflowers F1 Sugar Rush

Due to the sad news of Tony Grice, Steve Hewitt has stepped in and supplied some details about the ENTUA and what is happening in the coming months.



I'm not sure how many of you are aware but this year is the 200th anniversary of the birth of the railways, that started operating between Stockton and Darlington on 27th September in 1825.

ENTUA is planning to hold an exhibition at 'The Place', the site of the new Great Yarmouth Library during September. We will focus our exhibition on how the Railways grew until at one point just after the second world war, there were as many as 9 railway stations

in the Great Yarmouth greater area, including, of course a station in Belton on the direct Gt Yarmouth South town to Beccles line that closed in 1959. Our exhibition will not just focus on the past, but also look at how the railway is conceived and used today, but also looking at how ENTUA would like the railway to

develop in the next 10 years. We published a document looking ahead for the next 10 years in late 2023 so we will hopefully be able to contain some information in the document in our exhibition.

We are also hoping to take the exhibition to Gorleston Library, so keep your eyes open for more details being published as soon as we have them.

Finally may I remind you that our 2025 Public Open Meeting will be held at Christchurch, Deneside, Great Yarmouth at 14.15 on Wednesday 20th August.

Representatives from local railway and bus operators have been invited to speak and answer questions.



competition in Thetford. For most of them, it was their first ever event, but although some managed to win gold medals, each member over-performed regardless of the result, which is all we look for at that level, as well as enjoying the experience.

Although, it's always nice to see our members compete and/or progress through the grades, but it's important to point out that we put no pressure on anyone to do either. Some of our regulars simply attend sessions each week to maintain a level of



fitness, socialise and just have fun. Ages at the club currently range from 4 years old to 78 years old and everyone is included and accepted, with each member feeling part of the team. We are continuously welcoming newcomers, so if you're thinking you may be too old, too small, too overweight, lacking confidence, believe that your special needs may hold you back, or simply worry that you won't fit in, then think again!

Our groups are coached by head coach and former British Champion, Dominic King, who has 43 years of experience, as well as his 19 year old son Ryan King, who is a very realistic Olympic hopeful for the LA games in 2028.

At our judo club in Belton, we run two sessions on Tuesday evenings (see below for details), the first for younger children only, which is then followed by the second session that older children and adults can attend together.

For the younger children, we successfully use a mini grading system that helps them progress and gain confidence without the pressure of demonstrating difficult moves or learning Japanese

terminology. This obviously comes later once the children grow and become more advanced. The mini grading system uses a white belt with a coloured stripe running though the middle, with the colours keeping in line with the traditional belt system. This works really well as each week a child comes away with an extra signature on their grading card, so they can constantly see the progression. Two signatures are occasionally given for extra effort, excellent behaviour, helping new members and bravery etc. With these incentives, bad behaviour is extremely rare.

You would be very welcome to pay us a visit and would be offered 2 FREE SESSIONS before any form of payment is made. This gives everyone the opportunity to decide if the sport is for them without any pressure from the team. The warm welcome, the atmosphere within the group and the fact that the training caters for every individual's needs, almost guarantees that people return and eventually join. If you would like to start your own journey with us, you can come and join us now. 









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
