

As we await the appointment of a new vicar for the All-Saints Church, members of the Parochial Church Council Team have kindly stepped forward to write on behalf of our Church family.

# **Fritton** with St. Olaves **Parish Council**

he July meeting of the Council was held at St. Olaves Village Hall on the 17th with nine Parish Councillors, four members of the public and Kate Ruddock the Parish Clerk present. The officer appointments were made, having been delayed from the previous meeting. Cllr Richards was elected chair and Cllr Burton, vice-chair for the coming year.

An additional 'keep clear' box is to be painted on the road at the A143/Herringfleet Road junction in St. Olaves while the management of Fritton Lake are to be Olaves contacted about speeding vehicles using Church Lane when leaving their premises. Matters discussed by a group of Councillors who met with Highways Engineer included the box junction at St Olaves (above), a dip on Fritton New Road near the chicken farm, issues with the fencing on the Fritton Decoy site affecting visibility from New Road and the possibility of speed signs and better access when crossing the A143 to continue on the Angles Way footpath.

In the Council meeting Councillor Betts suggested the SAM2 anti speeding sign on the A143 at Fritton be moved across the road as it is being 40mph area, also the position used on New Road at Fritton needs to be reconsidered. A member of the public had requested a 'yellow box' at Priory Road/A143 the junction in St Olaves, it was however thought that this might not fit highways criteria. Councillor Stephens suggested the police speed gun team be asked to attend at the bottom of the hill on the A143 going from Fritton.

Councillor Stephens and

two members of the public will start working on a funding bid to the Great Yarmouth **Business Improvement Fund** to install a rest area and information point for Angles way near to the Fritton Village Sign, it would include a paved area and benches round the sign.

In planning the council had objected to a two-story side/rear extension at Pine View, Beccles Road, Fritton as out of character and concerns with vehicular access. There were no objections to works at Hillcrest, Heath Road, St (non-material amendments to demolition of helicopter shed and buildings and erection of two-story extension, new swimming pool, gym and garage). At Red Roofs, New Road, Fritton (single story side extension) there were no objections in principle but concerns that the extension might block light to neighbouring properties, no objections were raised to single story rear extension and front porch at 21 Priory Close in St. Olaves. The Borough Council approved outline permission (with all matters reserved) for one self-build dwelling at Forestry Cottage, New Road, Fritton.

Members had agreed by etriggered for at 30mph in the mail to which new e-mail address to use as in future as councils now have to use the '.gov.uk' suffix and the originally selected version would have given exceptionally long address. The next meeting of the Council will be at Fritton Village Hall on Thursday September 18th. commencing at 6.30pm, for information contact the Council via the Parish Clerk on 07899 846148, or e-mail fritton.stolaves.clerk@outloo k.com.

# THE MYTH OF THE STUBBORN DOG: WHY YOUR PUP ISN'T DEFYING YOU

"Stubborn" isn't a canine personality trait, it's a human misinterpretation. Science says confusion, pain, frustration, hormones, fear, or distractions are usually to blame.

# THE PROBLEM WITH THE "STUBBORN" LABEL

We've all been there, standing in the park, lead in hand, calling our dog's name and getting absolutely nothing back. It's tempting to mutter "HE'S BEING STUBBORN." An easy label to through at something for human gratification. Looking at behaviour science and veterinary research, that label does more harm than good. Dogs aren't plotting ways to defy us, they're reacting to their environment, their physical condition, and the clarity (or lack) of our cues (Bradshaw & Casey, 2007).

By swapping judgment for curiosity, we can turn those

moments of "defiance" into breakthroughs in understanding. Here is a pivotal moment to stop, look, listen and ask, what is really behind it?

#### BEHAVIOURAL SCIENCE: WHAT'S REALLY BEHIND "I WON'T"

DOGS DON'T DISOBEY OUT OF SPITE, THEY RESPOND BASED ON LEARNING HISTORY, MOTIVATION, AND EMOTIONAL STATE

From a scientific perspective, dogs are learning machines. They respond to reinforcement patterns, environmental context, and their own mental state, not moral codes.

- Confusion from unclear cues Dogs learn through associative learning and operant conditioning. If you sometimes say "COME" and other times "HERE", your dog may not connect both to the same behaviour. Similarly, a dog who "sits" at home but not in the park hasn't yet GENERALISED the skill (McGreevy & Boakes,
- Frustration & emotional arousal Repeated failure to earn a reward can cause frustration.
   Once this sets in, focus drops, and your dog's priority becomes relieving that emotional pressure, through sniffing, disengaging, or walking off.

• Low motivation & competing reinforcers Your dry biscuit reward may pale in comparison to the smell of a rabbit in the hedge. Training works best when rewards match the challenge (Rooney & Cowan, 2011).

# VETERINARY INSIGHTS: WHEN "NO" MEANS "I CAN'T"

RULE OUT PAIN BEFORE LABELLING A DOG "STUBBORN."

Sometimes, the issue isn't willingness, it's physical inability.

- Pain & musculoskeletal issues Arthritis, hip dysplasia, cruciate injuries, and spinal problems can make sitting, lying, or jumping painful (Kapatkin et al., 2006).
- Hormonal adolescence Dogs aged 6–18 months go through a "teenage" phase marked by hormonal shifts and reduced impulse control (Starling et al., 2013).
- Sensory decline Older dogs may miss cues due to hearing or vision loss.

# OTHER FACTORS THAT MASQUERADE AS STUBBORNNESS

- Fear/anxiety Overwhelming environments can shut down responsiveness.
- Cognitive fatigue Long or repetitive sessions exhaust focus.

- Environmental distractions Wildlife scents, other dogs, or noises steal attention.
- Negative past experiences If a cue has been linked to punishment, avoidance is likely.

#### WHAT THE EVIDENCE SAYS

The research is consistent: stubbornness is not a fixed canine trait. It's a placeholder humans use when we haven't yet identified the real reason for a behaviour. That reason may be communication gaps, physical challenges, developmental phases, or emotional states and once we identify it, we can address it compassionately.

# FROM FRUSTRATION TO UNDERSTANDING

When we replace "stubborn" with "something's getting in the way," our approach to training changes completely. We become problem-solvers, not judges. The payoff? A stronger bond, more effective training, and a happier, healthier dog.

ROAD AHEAD CLOSED

Polyanthus and primroses provide colour in the early months of the year and are frequently used as temporary bedding or in seasonal containers and window boxes.

The primrose is one of the first flowers to bloom in spring. Its name actually comes from the Latin word 'primus', which means 'first'. So, many believe that it has a meaning of youth, renewal and optimism.

Clusters of large, rounded flowers in a range of jewel-like colours, sometimes with contrasting centres and petal edges, nestle above mounds of soft leaves. A few have double flowers.

They will grow in most soils, provided they are not too wet or dry, in sun or light shade.

They do not do well on very limey (alkaline) soil or on soil that is prone to drying out. You can improve the soil with organic matter. They will not flower in deep shade.

Although some plants are capable of surviving after their first year, flowers in subsequent years are likely to be smaller and fewer in number, so plants are best replaced each year.

Did you know primrose colours are meant to symbolise different meanings, for example white primroses symbolise sadness and mourning. While red primroses are to symbolise passion, young love, charm and longing. Yellow primroses symbolise happiness, warmth and love while pink primroses symbolise grace, youth and renewal.



# A BRIEF HISTORY OF BURGH CASTLE ROMAN FORT

Burgh Castle is one of the best preserved roman forts in the country. Built in the 3rd century on a low bank above the Waveney estuary now surrounded by marshes, its substantial walls and sheer size of the fort is still very impressive.

**230's AD** ~ The Roman Empire faces a grave crisis. Internally, weakened by constant civil wars, the violent succession of brief emperors, while externally it faces a new wave of attacks by barbarian tribes.

Most of Britain has been part of the empire since the mid 1st century protected from raids in the north by the Hadrianic and Antonine Walls, while a fleet of some size was also available.

However, as the frontiers come under increasing external pressures, fortifications are built throughout the Empire in order to protect cities and guard strategically important locations. It is in this context that the forts of the Saxon Shore are constructed.

Under Severus Alexander, several units are withdrawn from the northern



frontier to garrison key locations in the south, with new forts built at Brancaster, Caister-on-Sea and Reculver. Dover is already fortified in the early 2nd century, and the other forts are built as part of

the Saxon Shore fortifactions.

**270's** ~ Burgh Castle is built under the command of the Count of the Saxon Shore for the Stablesian cavalry unit, 500 strong.

**300's** ~ Burgh and Caister Castles, collectively known as Gariannonum control the entrance to the Waveney estuary, which is occupied by extensive marshes.

**367** ~ Saxons, Picts and Scots make a concerted attack on Britain, the Saxon shoreline forts are overrun.

**630** ~ Sigeberht, King of the East Angles, gives land inside Burgh Castle to St Fursa to found a monastery. The site is now referred to as Cnobheresburh.

# **BYGONE YEARS**

Among the sideshows, Bowling went forward whenever the target area was clear of people. Hoopla (Mrs. Howes) had a good innings, and likewise the London Treasure (Elizabeth Howes). Lucky Dip (Mrs. Doddington) drew the customers until there was nothing more to dip for. Teas had to be queued for - no fault of Mrs. Beare and Mrs. Twaits, who gave a first-class brew, with Mrs. Abbs and Mrs. Gray in the background.

All through the afternoon two ponies were up and down the drive giving rides, expertly managed by Marie Rogers and Peter Liffen. And there at the gate was Mr. George Guyton smoking his pipe and taking more admission money than ever before.

The children of Belton Primary School produced quite an art gallery of pictures for the competition of showing some village scene. I had not realised that I was part of the scene until I spotted one or two alleged portraits. The work was so good that it was hard to choose, but eventually a prize-winner was decided on for each year from 6 to 11 years old. The infants too had 6 prizes, for decorated hats (girls) and for potato figures (boys).

It was altogether a day that made one want to sing "Praise God from whom all blessings flow".

# LAST DAY AT BELTON SCHOOL

After running for 108 years in the present building, Belton School has ceased to exist - although two of its staff and most of its pupils will go on to be part of the new Waveney School.

The Parent-Teachers Association made the presentation of a handsome tankard to the outgoing Headmaster, Mr. T. Stone, in recognition of his services to the School over the years. The School and staff also made him a presentation in the form of a leather brief-case.

Other presentations were also being made. Miss Harding received a farewell gift. And Mrs. Coleman who has looked after the School as Cleaner in Charge received the gift of a pair of rose-bowls. Also, the morning Sunday School presented her with a table-lamp in appreciation of her co-operation. And every child was made the proud recipient of a Prince of Wales Investiture mug, a gift arranged by the P.T.A. To the new school the P.T.A. presented a polished rustic bench seat.

So Belton School now becomes the Old School - but it can be proud of the long line of those who have learned there, and those who have taught there. There are many former pupils still in the village, and there are some who have gone on to higher education or have made a name for themselves in other ways - like John Mills for instance, whose father was at one time the master in charge of Belton School, living at the School House.

The question in all our minds is what is going to be the future use of the Old School. I put this question to the General Secretary of the National Society, which holds the Trust Deed, and I got this reply:

"The formal position at Belton is that the school premises (except the School House) are ..subject to reverter on closure (School Sites Acts - solely educational trusts)." That is to say, they go back to the descendants of the original donors.

But we have not quite given up hope that the village may be able to acquire the use of the Old School as a community centre. We must hear what the Department of Education has to say - and also what it would cost to run.



# **BELTON IN** 1934

(Kellys 1934 directory of **Great Yarmouth)**

The directory was started in 1836 by Frederic Festus Kelly and continued to be published for many decades, with Kelly's Directories Ltd. taking over in 1897.

BRADWELL is a parish and village, 3 miles south-south-west from Yarmouth (Southtown) station on the London and North Eastern railway from Liverpool Street, and 8 north-west from Lovestoft, in the Lowestoft parliamentary division of the county of Suffolk, hundred, petty sessional division of Mutford and Lothingland, Great Yarmouth county court district, rural deanery of Flegg, archdeacoury and diocese of Norwich. The church of 8t. Nicholas, which dates back to 1890, is a structure of flint with stone dressings, in the Later Decorated style, consisting of a chancel, nave, aisles, south porch and low round western tower containing 3 bells; the font is octagonal, and adorned with carved figures, four of which represent the evangelists; the chancel retains a piscina and sedilia, and on the north side are two carved kneeling figures; the communion plate includes a chalice inscribed "BRADWELL, CHYRCH CVP, 1668;" in 1875 the church was partially restored and reseated with open benches, at a cost of about £900, and a new pulpit, reading desk and chancel stals creeted, and an open-timbered roof was also placed above the chancel; the church has also two beautiful stained glass windows, in memory of Mrs. Louisa Gertrude Walker, wife of a former rector, and another in memory of Charles Wiltshire esq. and his wife, and of Major Percy Wiltshire, who was killed in the Great War 1914-1918; the porch was rebuilt in 1889 at a cost of about £200, and the churchyard enlarged in 1891; in 1905 a beautiful tablet was placed in the church in memory of the Rev. John Walker, who was rector here for 40 years: in 1907 the church was restored at a cost, over £1,000, the bells rehung, the roof relaid and a new vestry was built on the north side of the chancel and a new heating apparatus added: a new




